# **100 YEARS OF SERVICE**

The Mirror Lake Community Library celebrated its centennial last month on December 1st. Built in 1915, the library has always been an important part of the city's history. The building, which became the first permanent home to the city's public library system and was a signal that the area had grown from a village to a city that valued cultural institutions.

It all began in 1899 when a reading room was opened on Central Avenue run by a group of volunteers. Two years later, Andrew Carnegie, then the richest person in the world, retired at the age of 66 and become a philanthropist, giving money to good causes. He

believed in the "Gospel of Wealth," meaning wealthy people were morally obligated to give their money back to society. Throughout his life, Andrew Carnegie loved to read. As a young man, he lived near Colonel James Anderson, a rich man who allowed working boys to use his personal library for free. In those days, America did not have free public libraries. He

never forgot Anderson's generosity and, as a result, wanted to give money to support education and reading; he eventually gave away enough money to build more than 3,000 public libraries.

A campaign was begun in St. Petersburg for a Carnegie library grant to build a real library, but it was unsuccessful. Finally, in 1913 W. L. Straub, who was the owner of the Evening Independent newspaper, personally convinced Carnegie officers to provide a \$17,500 grant.

Once the grant was approved by the city, a search was conducted for the library's location and Mirror Lake was chosen on July 17, 1914. The building was designed in the Beaux Arts style - one of the earliest examples of that style in our area. The building's architect, Henry D. Whitfield, worked for the Carnegie Corporation and designed this library, as well as many other Carnegie libraries in the same style. The construction contract was awarded to W. C. Henry who laid the cornerstone on Dec. 19, 1914.

When the library opened one year later on December 1, 1915, there were 2,600 books. The library would become one of fourteen Florida Carnegie libraries to receive grants from 1901 to 1917 and remained St. Petersburg's only library until the current Main library was built at 3745 9th Avenue in 1964. By 1947, when the library's collection had grown to 45,000 volumes, a new wing was built in 1951 to house the expanded collection. It mirrored the Beaux Arts style.

By the time the Mirror Lake Library was added to the National Registry of Historic Places on June 13, 1986, it was in disrepair. A faulty air conditioning system, water damage and mold beset the building. The only way to reach the second floor was by a small, winding staircase; the main entrance had

also been sealed. In 1987, a plan to restore the library was approved which included removing the wing added in 1951, and building a new 8,000 square-foot wing in its place. The restored library opened in May of 1997. Inside and out the charm of the building had been returned to the days of its

Of fourteen total Carnegie libraries built in Florida from 1901 to 1917, Mirror Lake is one of only two still operating as a library.



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


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#### **NO MORE WILLIAMS PARK BUSES**

Since 1952, Williams Park has been the transfer hub for Pinellas County Transit Authorities' approximately 16 different bus routes. In an effort to improve Williams Park, this is being changed and the bus stops surrounding the park are being removed.

Instead of a hub-and-spoke system, where all buses pull into a common location, the buses will follow a new grid system. With this new system, buses travel direct paths that keep them predominantly on their own street—no turning off for transfer hubs. This grid pattern allows routes to be streamlined and eliminates the time it takes to pull in and circle Williams Park. The grid system also creates a more direct path for riders traveling to a specific location. Instead of having to get off at Williams Park and walk, riders will have more options with added stops along the street.

The down side is there is no longer a single place to catch the bus. The route you need, and its direction, will determine where you can catch your bus. The City management and nearby businesses hope that this will reduce the number of people who choose to spend their days in Williams Park.

Redesigning service in the downtown area will improve direct access to other destinations in downtown for passengers and open the park for greater enjoyment by all residents and visitors.



We're talking about 100 people who have been given a chance to rebuild their lives - That's a lot of people to feed!"

Momentum is growing as residents and businesses sign on to hold "Soup-er Bowl" food drives throughout southern Pinellas County. #### DO YOU OWN A DRONE?

If you purchased or received a drone this past Christmas, you are not alone. In September 2015, Fortune Magazine estimated the number of drones or Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAV) that would be purchased during the past holiday season was projected to be close to 1 million. This increased popularity is cause for some regulation awareness being brought to the forefront.

In February 2015, the FAA released a Notice of Purposed Rulemaking for small, unmanned aircraft. This opened the door to the beginning of the rulemaking process. Most recently, the FAA announced required registration of all drones weighing between 0.55 pounds and 55 pounds (including mounted camera equipment). Failure to register carries some hefty fines and penalties. The FAA can assess civil penalties up to \$27,500 and criminal penalties of up to \$250,000 in fines and/or imprisonment of up to three years.

The FAA has partnered with the Association for Unmanned Vehicle Systems and the Academy of Model Aeronautics to create the Know Before You Fly campaign to educate current and future UAV owners about the safe and responsible operation of their systems. This campaign will help operators of UAVs understand the differences between recreational, commercial and public entity use.

Whether you are flying a UAV for fun or for business, it's important to understand your liability. Michael Atwell, Risk Management Consultant with Bill Arrington Insurance Agency, recently stated, "Recreational users need to fully understand their homeowners policies when flying."

Potential for bodily and personal injury, as well as property damage, exists. A homeowners policy may cover recreational UAV use. However, as with every insurance coverage issue, the availability of coverage depends on the specific policy's language, i.e. the definition of "aircraft."

Mr. Atwell also cautions, "Invasion of privacy claims are another major concern with the



emerging recreational UAV operations since cameras are often attached to most of the systems being flown today. How does that work with your homeowners insurance?"

The line between recreational and business can be confusing. Insureds who receive compensation for the use of their UAV will most likely jeopardize their homeowners coverage. For example, taking photographs with a UAV for personal use is likely considered recreational. Conversely, taking photos for a realty listing for a fee or as a part of a part time real estate brokerage business is not likely considered recreational.

The FAA categorizes those who operate UAVs as "aviators," and with this distinction comes great responsibilities. For better understanding of the regulations, registration and safety, visit the following websites:

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#### **ELECTION MARCH 15TH**

#### Florida is a Closed Primary State

Both the Republican and Democratic Parties are selecting a presidential nominee this year. In order to vote for a candidate in the Presidential Preference Primary, you must be registered with one of these two major political parties. However, all registered voters in municipalities holding elections in conjunction with the Presidential Preference Primary may vote for all municipal contests and ballot questions. This is because Florida is a "closed primary state." In a Primary Election, a qualified voter is entitled to vote the ballot of the political party with which the voter is registered:

- A voter registered as a Republican may vote for Republican, Nonpartisan candidates and ballot issues only
- A voter registered as a Democrat may vote for Democratic, Nonpartisan candidates and ballot issues only
- A voter registered with a minor party may only vote for the minor party, Nonpartisan candidates and ballot issues.
- A voter registered with no party may only vote for Nonpartisan candidates and ballot issues only

It is important to remember Tuesday, February 16 is the deadline to register to vote and to change your political party affiliation for the March 15 Presidential Preference Primary and Municipal Elections. No political party changes can be made after this deadline. Any political party affiliation changes made between February 17 and March 15, 2016, will take effect for future elections.

If you would like to change your political party affiliation, mail a signed written notice with your change of political party affiliation to the Supervisor of Elections Office and include your date of birth OR your voter information number; or complete a Voter Registration Application with your political party affiliation change and check "Record Update/Change" in the top box.



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# FEBRUARY LEAD DAY

#### **2016 IS A LEAP YEAR**

Years containing a Leap Year Day are called Leap Years. 2016 is such a year. Leap Year Day falls on February 29th, as it always does, but do you know why we even have Leap Years?

A Leap Day is added every so many years to keep our Gregorian calendar in alignment with the Earth's revolutions around the sun. It takes

revolutions around the sun. It takes the Earth approximately 365.242199 days, (what we refer to as a year) to circle once around the sun. If we did not add a Leap Year Day every so often, we would have close to six extra hours each year. Over time that builds up - at the end of 100 years, our calendar would have shifted 25 days; after 700 years, our summer would happen during December.

In 45 BC, during Julius Caesar's rule, the Romans were the first to discover the problem. When they created the Julian calendar, named after their emperor February 24th was their leap day. It made sense because in their calendar, February was the last month of the year.

In 1582, during Pope Gregory XIII's reign, the Julian calendar was refined creating the Gregorian calendar. The new calendar changed many previously known dates and months, and established Leap Year Day as February 29th, the 60th day of almost every fourth year. However, nothing is never that simple. Other adjustments are required ever century or so.

A Leap Year occurs in almost, but not all years divisible by 4. Years that are divisible by 100, and not by 400, are not leap years. Thus 1800 and 1900 were not leap years; 1600


and 2000 were.

A Leap Year Day baby is a person born on February 29th. They are commonly referred to as a "Leapling." During a non-leap year, some Leaplings celebrate their birthdays on February 28 while others on March 1; it is their choice. Some only celebrate getting older every fourth year.

Leap Year Day is also referred to as Bachelor Day in some cultures. This is not to be confused with Sadie Hawkins Day, a November holiday made up by the comic strip, Li'l Abner. On Bachelor Day (Leap Year Day) a single woman may propose marriage to the bachelor of her choice. If the man refuses, he is obligated to give the woman money or buy her a dress. In upper-class Europe, he must buy her 12 pairs of gloves, used to hide the woman's embarrassment of not having an engagement ring. So, women if you are not married yet, start looking for that available bachelor.

#### Fun Leap Year facts:

- A Utah woman is known to have given birth three times on February 29th. In 2004, 2008 and 2012.
- In Greece it is unlucky to marry on Leap Year Day.
- For 20 years, Anthony, Texas has been the self-proclaimed "Leap Year Capital of the World". Its festival, a birthday party for "leapers," attracts people from around the world.
- About four million living people are estimated to have been born on February 29. About 200,000 live in the U.S.
- If you are a salaried employee, you are working for free that day.
- The frog (probably due to the game Leap Frog) is a symbol associated with Leap Year Day

Get rid of things you don't need in the pantry and cabinets, wash the shelves and arrange everything as if you were Martha Stewart.



# ST PETE CELEBRATES THE 30TH ANNIVERSARY OF AMERICA'S MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. NATIONAL PARADE

On January 18, 2016, the 30th Martin Luther King, Jr. National Parade, Battle of Bands and Drum Line Extravaganza was held in St. Petersburg. It is the first, oldest, and largest MLK parade. It was founded by two brothers: Sevell C. Brown, III and Darryl Lamont Brown, Sr. and first held on January 20, 1986.

Sevell Brown says the first parade was a result of his vision from God after he experienced the death of his beloved grandmother on October 31, 1985. Brown's throat muscles would involuntarily constrict and cut off his breathing when he came too close to his grandmother, Maggie Church's wake or funeral. Brown had experienced this same medical phenomenon with the loss of his beloved paternal grandmother, Altamease Campbell, in 1972.

Not able to cry or grieve, Brown prayed for God to deliver him from his situation. God awakened him at 2:30 am. a few mornings later and showed him a vision, in panoramic view as if he was in a theater, of Historical Black Colleges & Universities (HBCU) marching bands and floats marching and riding down the streets in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Brown immediately jumped up and began drafting the format of the King Parade. He became obsessed with the vision God had given him of a traditional National Parade with floats and bands in honor of Dr. King. God preoccupied his mind to such an extent that it got Brown through the loss of his grandmother, for the next three months.

Two years before, after 18 years of lobbying, President Ronald Reagan signed the Federal King Holiday Bill on November 3, 1983, making the third Monday of every January, the Federal King Holiday. The first Federal King Holiday would become effective and celebrated on January 20, 1986.

Prior to 1986, the Civil Rights lieutenants of Dr. King and the rest of America only celebrated Martin Luther King, Jr. in the form of traditional Civil Right Marches as practiced by Dr. King in the Selma to Montgomery, Birmingham and Washington, D.C. historic marches. There were no "traditional parades" in the sense of a "Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade" or "Rose Bowl Parade" with floats and marching bands in honor of Dr. King. Two months before the first Federal King Holiday, the Browns ignored warnings from the Southern Christian

Leadership Conference (SCLC) and

King Lieutenants that holding a monumental Dr. King Parade would be an impossible task to accomplish in only two short months. They were advised to stick with a "memorial march." Brown had already participated in those types of marches as a student at Clark College in the Atlanta University Center in 1970 and decided to take a separate path. He was told he could go ahead with his parade plans, but not to ask for or expect any financial support from SCLC. Against all odds, in less than two months, they successfully introduced the concept of the traditional "Annual Martin Luther King, Jr. National Parade, Battle of Bands & Drum Line Extravaganza" to America. On January

20, 1986, for the first time in U.S. history, white marching bands and African American marching bands performed together, while paying tribute to Martin Luther King, Jr. in St. Petersburg.

The response to the concept was overwhelming. Police attendance count for the first parade was 25,000; the second year the count was 38,000 and by the third year it was 60,000 people. Brown lobbied the Pinellas County School Board and won a major victory when the Board declared Dr. King's birthday a School Board Holiday. By the fourth year, 80,000 attended the parade. Since then, it has averaged 100,000. That means some 2.5 million people have attended the parade over the last 29 years.

Brown's vision was designed to expose, teach and instill an appreciation of who Dr. King was and his significance to generations of young elementary, middle and high school students. Brown's premise was "To reach youth, you must reach them where they are, not in the skies where adults wish for them to aspire." In 1985, the youth of America could not be separated from their boom boxes and their music. Brown simply replaced the boom boxes with African American University bands.

This strategic move by Brown reflected a valuable lesson he learned about the music of Black American slave, while a student under Dr. Wendell Phillip Whalum in Afro American Studies at Morehouse College. "Music is never music for music sake. It is always reflective of the experiences through which Blacks have gone and are still going through." Just as the Negro Spiritual, Blues, Jazz, and Gospel music was indicative of this unique application of music to life's experiences, so it is with the music and Marching Art Form of the Historical Black Colleges and Universities Marching Bands.

Brown's idea was to utilize sophisticated orchestrations of marching band music, composed by master band directors, using the "Art Form of High Stepping Marching Style" to cover the entire Federal King Birthday celebration, making this its center and foundation. The intrinsic masterful musical dynamics of master band directors replaced the boom boxes and took the minds of children to a higher level.

When university bands took to the streets in the parade, and performed at the Tropicana Field in the battle of bands festival named after Dr. King, each time the Drum Majors raised and planted their feet in their famous, spirited, unique high-stepping performance routines, children began to speak and proudly proclaim, unlike ever before, that they knew who Martin Luther King, Jr. "He's the drum major for justice who died for us! He's THE drum major that the university & high school band's drum majors marched to honor in the MLK National Parade."

Over the years, all visiting bands from 15 different states left St. Petersburg and took the concept of "A Traditional MLK Parade Celebration" back to their hometowns and many implemented Sevell Brown's Vision from God. Now, America's Annual MLK National Drum Major for Justice Parade, Battle of Bands and Drum Line Extravaganza in St. Petersburg, has been duplicated throughout America as the chosen manner to celebrate Dr. King's birthday.

# CHINESE NEW YEAR ITS THE YEAR OF THE MONKEY

This year, the Chinese New Year, which is the Year of the Monkey, falls on February 8. It is just as important to the Chinese people as our New Year's Day is, however, the date of The Chinese New Year changes.

Chinese New Year is celebrated at the turn of the Chinese calendar and the literal translation is the Spring Festival. Different celebrations traditionally run



from the last day of the last month of the Chinese calendar (Chinese New Year's Eve) until the Lantern Festival which is the 15th day of the first month. Chinese New Year's Day is known as Yuandan, meaning "the first sunrise." Most people start to celebrate one week prior, on the 23rd day of the 12th month.

The tradition of the Chinese New Year goes back centuries, and is based on several myths and traditions. More than 4,000 years ago, according to legend, on the day Shun (a Chinese mythological emperor) ascended to the throne, he led his ministers to worship heaven and earth. From then on, that day was regarded as the Chinese calendar's first day of the lunar month. This is the basic origin of the Chinese New Year. China adopted the Gregorian calendar in 1911, so the Chinese New Year was renamed The Spring Festival.

It has evolved into an opportunity to honor tradition and ancestors. Often, the evening before New Year's Day, Chinese families gather for an annual reunion dinner. It is a time for families to cleanse the house, to sweep away ill fortune and to make way for good luck to come to them.


People put red posters on their doors with poetic verses, pictures on their walls and decorate their homes with red lanterns which symbolize pursuing the bright and the beautiful. Children often receive luck money in red envelopes. As it is a time of new, many wear new clothes that day.

The evening includes lots of fireworks, once again hoping to drive away any bad luck and bring forth the good luck. Firecrackers symbolizes good luck in the coming year. Other activities involve beating drums, striking gongs, and dancing with participants in dragon and lion costumes.

2016 is the Year of the Monkey. For those born this year, 2015 is considered to an auspicious year. Legend has it, those born in the Year of the Monkey are said to be witty, intelligent and have a magnetic personality. Personality traits, like mischievousness, curiosity, and cleverness, make them very naughty. Monkeys are masters of practical jokes, because they like playing most of the time. Though they don't have any bad intentions, their pranks sometimes hurt the feelings of others.

Those born in a year of the Monkey are fast learners and crafty opportunists. They have many interests and need partners who are capable of stimulating them. While some like the eccentric nature of Monkeys, some don't trust their sly, restless, and inquisitive nature. Previous years of The monkey are 1920, 1932, 1944, 1956, 1968, 1980, 1992, 2004.

The Chinese New Year while it is celebrated in China, is also popular in many other Asian countries with significant Chinese populations, as well as in Chinatowns in cities around the world.



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


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# TOM PRITCHARD His Food Lives On

Tom Pritchard, a partner with Bay Star Restaurants, and resident of old Northeast St. Petersburg, was one of Tampa Bay's most influential and respected chefs. He passed away November 25th, the day before his favorite holiday, Thanksgiving.

Pritchard could always tell a good story. He got his restaurant start by creating a fake resume to get a job in



Miami at the upscale Rusty Pelican Restaurant. "I had no idea what I was doing, but I have always been a fast learner," Tom would say. "The secret to learning is being around people who are smarter than you."

Locally, Pritchard opened the 94th Aero Squadron, was the head chef at the Feather Sound Country Club and a few other places. Then, he met Frank Chivas, owner of Baystar Restaurants which include Salt Rock Grill and Island Way Grill among others.

"I've known Tom since the 1970s," said Chivas, long time friend, and business partner. "Tom was a rock star in the culinary world."

Chivas hired Pritchard when he opened Salt Rock Grill in Indian Shores in 1997. Pritchard was the restaurant's Executive Chef. As the list of company restaurants grew, he also oversaw the menus and kitchens at the other Bay Star restaurants including Island Way Grill, Marlin Darlin's, and Rumba Island Bar and Grill.

Pritchard was the main draw at many local fundraisers. The Abilities Foundation was one of his favorite charities, and he helped host big and small events for them.

"We ended up doing maybe 175 wine dinners together," said Frank DeLucia, CEO of the Abilities Foundation. "Tom was a fixture at all our dinners. He was usually the main attraction." Together, they helped raise over \$4 million dollars for Abilities.

Pritchard is best remembered for his willingness and ability to teach, motivate and mentor many of our area's best chefs. The list includes the chefs at Parkshore Grill, Bern's Steakhouse, Z-Grille and many others. He would take the time to really talk to up-and-coming chefs, sharing his knowledge, tips and even recipes. He contributed recipes and ideas for many new restaurant's menus

"What Tom did was make chefs proud of their work and happy to be in the kitchen," said Chris Sherman, former food critic for the St Petersburg Times.

"Tom's favorite holiday was always Thanksgiving," says Chivas. "Tom loved to tell the story of how he once cooked Thanksgiving dinner for 300 expatriates in Majorca. At Salt Rock, he would do all the dressings and gravies himself," Chivas reflects. "We called it Chef Tom's feast."

No one knew more about food and wine than Tom," Chivas goes on. "He was funny--had a great sense of humor. He was the Godfather of our hospitality industry. He was just a beautiful person. He always gave more than he took."

Tom died from complications of Parkinson's disease and was 74 years old. He was in the kitchen cooking until almost the end.

# RONALD MCDONALD HOUSE IS KEEPING FAMILIES CLOSE

Kristy Chase Tozer is a former board member and enthusiastic supporter of Ronald McDonald House. Two years ago, her daughter was critically ill and the Tozer family required the resources of Ronald McDonald House to help them through a very difficult time. Her story is an example of what RMH families go through, every day of the year. This is her story.

For the early part of 2013, we spent six months trying to identify the cause of debilitating respiratory issues that our two-year old daughter Kaiea was suffering. In late August we were told that Kaiea was suffering from an uncommon neurological disorder called Chiari Malformation. Our little girl was scheduled for brain surgery at All Children's Hospital (ACH) the following day. The doctors tried to reassure us by saying that this operation was as "routine" as brain surgery can be. Kaiea's procedure involved a "decompression" in which a small piece of bone at the base of her skull is removed to allow adequate space for her brain. The surgery was scheduled to last a few hours, followed by a stay in the PICU and then onto the neuro floor for another day or two and then she would be able to go home. It sounded simple enough, but there were complications.

Following surgery, Kaiea was unable to breathe independently. By the end of that week, we realized that she would be spending at least five more days in the PICU. Although we live in Tampa and ACH isn't that far from home, it seemed incredibly distant from our baby who lay in an induced coma. I sent an email to my associates at RMHC asking for help arranging a room at one of the St. Pete houses while we waited for our daughter's next procedure.

Since Kaiea was in the PICU, we were able to secure a room in the Central House, which meant we didn't even have to leave the hospital. My husband checked-in that afternoon and would spend the next nine nights in our new homeaway-from-home. I spent most of those nights in my daughter's room, but each morning when my husband relieved me, I would walk to the house for a hot shower, a bit of food and if time permitted, a quick nap.

Kaiea spent 16 days in ACH and we came to appreciate our little respite at the Ronald McDonald House. On consecutive Sundays our family descended on the Central House and took turns relieving us so that we could enjoy lunch, and visit with our two older children and other family members. We savored those moments. It was therapeutic for all of us. I have often thought, where else could we have enjoyed a hot meal and a family gathering without leaving the hospital?

A year has now passed since our stay at the Ronald McDonald House. Kaiea has made a remarkable recovery, and today is doing well, thanks to the amazing care she received. Our family is stronger than ever, due in no small measure to the love and support we received during a very trying time in our lives. We plan to celebrate our good fortune and express our appreciation by hosting a meal at the Central House. It feels like the least we can do after receiving such hospitality and compassion from the staff and volunteers. We take every opportunity to share our story with others, offering a message of hope and inspiration that difficult times can improve and better days may lie ahead.

Over the years, we have heard stories from families who stayed at the Ronald McDonald House and what a gift was for them during difficult times. 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
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# IMPORTANT WORK TO DO IN THE NEW YEAR

It's a new year in Pinellas County and we've got important work to do! I am honored to serve as Chairman of your Board of County Commissioners in 2016. There's so much opportunity to build on our positive momentum as a community. As our economy gets stronger, we continue to focus on taking care of our county's most critical needs while investing wisely for future growth.



As a board, we are accountable to taxpayers to be responsible stewards of the public's resources, especially going into a year with a healthy county budget. In the coming year, we will keep building on our long-term efforts to grow smarter as our peninsula redevelops. Limited space and an economy that's picking up speed means a thorough review of our land-use regulations will be a priority for the county and other municipal governments. County staff will also stay busy making improvements to our storm water system to ensure vulnerable communities are safe from flood waters. Without the improvements we've already completed, the month of rain we experienced last summer would have caused even worse flooding for residents in low-lying parts of our county.

We also have a responsibility to carry on our work to help our most economically vulnerable residents. After decades of meetings and studies about the impoverished condition of Lealman, we are starting to make real progress toward transforming this community for the better. Our opportunity to purchase nearly eight acres that will be set aside for affordable housing is sure to have a long-term impact on working families who call Lealman home. We have only scratched the surface in places such as Lealman and Midtown St. Petersburg. In the past year, both were designated as Community Redevelopment Areas, which means future property tax values will go directly back to the people who live there rather than to the general fund.

The hard economic times we're coming out of as a county have taught us how to do more with less. I'm proud of all the things we're doing in local government while maintaining the same staff levels as 1987. Our county employees are working harder and smarter than ever before. As we slowly begin to add staff back to critical departments, we will continue to find ways to be more efficient and effective in our service to citizens.

We have important decisions ahead. There is substantially more revenue available from the record tourism year we are having with the "bed tax." Decisions need to be made regarding the expenditure of these funds including any allocation towards stadium construction expenses for the Tampa Bay Rays, Rowdies, Dunedin Blue Jays, Clearwater Threshers as well as other eligible capital projects. Florida Statute sets specific guidelines and limitations for how these dollars can be expended. Because of the record tourism rates, Pinellas is now classified as a high-impact tourism destination in Florida. The board will have decisions to make in the coming months about how best to utilize about \$7 million that our county is receiving for economic damages from the BP oil spill.




