Florida's First President was a Whig

As most know, we are in the middle of a Presidential election. Since becoming the 27th state, Florida voters have participated in forty-two such elections; as part of the Confederacy, Florida did not vote during the Civil War. State voters have collectively chosen the winning candidate thirty-one times.

In Presidential elections, Florida voters have chosen sixteen Republicans, twenty-five Democrats, and one Whig. The first national election Floridians participated in was between Whig candidate Zachary Taylor, who was elected, and incumbent Democratic candidate James Polk who was defeated.

The Whig Party emerged in the 1830s as opposition to President Andrew Jackson and his newly formed Democrats. It was led by Kentucky's Henry Clay. The name "Whig" was derived from the name of an English party that was against absolute monarchy. The new party attempted to portray Jackson as "King Andrew."

The party pulled together members of the old National Republican Party and disgruntled Democrats. Whigs also had links to the defunct Federalist Party - the country's first political party. - Continued on page 7

MOSQUITO CONTROL Mosquitoes only need a quarter to one-half inch of standing water for larvae to survive Keep containers dry: flower pots, garbage cans, recycling containers, wheelbarrows, aluminum cans, boat tarps, old tires and buckets. Clean roof gutters, which can become clogged and hold water. Flush ornamental bromeliads or treat with BTI, a biological larvicide available at home stores. Cover rain barrels with screening. Flush birdbaths and wading pools weekly. These easy steps will help minimize your exposure to these bloodsucking insects.

FOOD DISTRIBUTION CONTINUES The

Salvation Army in Clearwater and Upper Pinellas County will continue USDA food box drive-through distribution at Ruth Eckerd Hall. Food distribution



was previously held in the morning, but will now be moving to 1 pm and last each day until all boxes have been given away.

During June and July, more than 3,500 boxes of food have been given to families in need. "On average, this equates to feeding more than 10,000 people," says Morris. "This includes a foster family of 14 teenage boys who remind us how much growing boys can eat." Boxes contain a protein (typically precooked chicken), milk, butter, cheese, fresh produce, and fruit. 

Zachary Taylor-Florida's Most Forgettable President, cont.

The Whigs were an active political party from about 1833 until 1856 particularly thriving after 1840. They favored what was called the "American System" - protective tariffs, federal subsidies for infrastructure improvements, and creating a national bank. The party advocated modernization, rule of law, and protections against tyranny. The Whig's base of support was centered among entrepreneurs, reformers, Protestants, and the emerging middle class—but it had little backing from farmers and unskilled workers.

For those days, The Whigs were considered to be right of center. Democratic opponents often stereotyped them as the "party of the rich", but in reality, the Whigs were supported by an economically diverse group of voters, winning State and Presidential elections with mass support.

Whig candidate Zachary Taylor won Florida's first presidential election. The twelfth President of the United States, he was the second President elected from the Whig Party, and would become the second president to die in office. William Henry Harrison, the first Whig President had previously died in office.

Taylor was a military man. He served in the U.S. Army rising to the rank of Major General. He was a Captain in the War of 1812, fought under Andrew Jackson in the Black Hawk War (an Indian conflict), led troops into Florida during the second Seminole War, and led troops in the Mexican American War (during the annexation of Texas).

The Whig Party had to convince a reluctant Taylor to run for President on their 1848 ticket. The Whig National Convention picked Millard Filmore as his running mate. While a well-known war hero, Taylor's political tenets were vague and not common knowledge. No other president had ever been elected without having held prior office. As it would turn out though, President Taylor would have a very short tenure.

Taylor took office on March 4, 1849. The country was only 73 years old and there were many controversies to deal with, but from the beginning, he kept his distance from Congress and even his cabinet.

There was much debate over slavery. The "Mexican Cession" was still an issue. Mexico had ceded land to the U.S. in 1848 after the Mexican–American War. Acquiring the land re-kindled the debate in Congress over slavery. Southerners hoped to enlarge the territory that would enter the union as slave states.

Anti-slavery northerners feared that very outcome. Despite being a southerner and slaveholder himself, Taylor did not push for the expansion of slavery.

Taylor urged settlers in New Mexico and California to draft constitutions of statehood, before new laws on slavery could be passed. When the "Compromise of 1850" (also called the Missouri Compromise) was introduced, the new law acted as a temporary truce on the issue of slavery, primarily addressing the status of the newly acquired territory.

On July 9, 1850, Zachary Taylor died, suddenly. It was reported after attending a Fourth of July event, he walked along the Potomac River eating large quantities of cherries and other fruits, while drinking iced water. A few days later he succumbed to what they called "stomach disease."

It was also reported he had ingested prescribed doses of opium, quinine, and calomel (a mercury compound). Some historians have concluded he was poisoned. No one knows the truth.

Due in part to his short sixteen-month term in office, historians ranked Taylor near the bottom of memorable Presidents, even referring to him to as the "Most Forgettable President in History."

Taylor was succeeded by his Vice President, Millard Fillmore who helped pass the "Compromise of 1850." That led to his defeat in the following election.

Already anemic, The Whig Party suffered a decisive defeat in 1852 due to divisions within the party. Tensions were mounting over the issue of slavery—as the country continued expanding to the west. For the Whig Party, the final straw was the signing of the "Kansas-Nebraska Act of 1854" which overturned the Missouri Compromise and allowed each state or territory to decide for itself whether it would be a slave state or free state. The Whig Party collapsed.

Many alarmed Whigs formed the anti-slavery Republican Party in 1854. That newly formed party nominated Abraham Lincoln, who won the Presidential election of 1860.

Note: Key West is home to a Fort named for Zachary Taylor. The 54 acre Park and National Historic Landmark is located on the western tip of Key West. Construction began in 1845 and the fort was used during the Spanish-American War, World Wars I & II and during the Cuban Missile Crisis. Today, it is known for its amazing snorkeling, fishing, and trails.

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


MIKE TWITTY Pinellas County Property Appraiser

Mike Twitty is the Pinellas County Property Appraiser, but do you know what he actually does?

Under Twitty's leadership, the Property Appraiser department evaluates, estimates, and officially certifies the value of all the properties in Pinellas County. Various taxing authorities and the Department of Revenue use that information each year.

Twitty, who was born and raised in Pinellas County and graduated from



The Office of Property Appraiser is an elected position. Twitty, elected in 2016, is completing in his first term and will be on the ballot again in November. For 27 years prior to his election, Twitty was a professional property appraiser, appraising a wide array of commercial and residential projects in Pinellas County and across the state.

Many home buyers do not realize the "assessed value" of a home resets to its market value on the January 1 following its purchase. Out of state and first-time home buyers are surprised when it happens. You can estimate your taxes after purchase by using the "Tax Estimator" tool on the Property Appraiser's web site, www.PCPAO.org. The tool also takes into consideration homestead exemption and portability.


The deadline to late file for a 2020 Homestead Exemption is September 18. When making a 2020 application you need to also complete an extenuating circumstances form. Our COVID-19 disruption is a valid circumstance.


"Pinellas is Florida's sixth largest county, based on population, and the second to smallest in land area," says Twitty. "as a result, we are #1 in density. We have more people per square mile than any other county - more than twice the #2 county, Broward. For example, we have 3,500 people per square mile compared to 1,700 people per square mile in Broward (Ft. Lauderdale). As an effectively built-out county we must focus on responsible redevelopment."

"We are dedicated to producing fair and equitable Property Value Assessments within the county," adds Twitty. "I worked extremely hard during my first term to create efficiencies to improve internal operations and elevate our service to the public. I'm also actively engaged in the flood insurance arena as I understand the kind of impact it can have on our property owners and the equity in their homes," says Twitty.

Twitty was the catalyst for Constitutional Amendment #5 that will appear on the ballot in November. The amendment adds an additional year to the eligible portability time frame, guaranteeing a minimum of "two years" to transfer your "Save Our Homes" benefit and a maximum of up to 3 years, depending on date of sale. The current law allows two tax years, which effectively can be as short as one year and a day if a property is sold at year end.

SOCIAL SECURITY... GETTING ALL THAT YOU DESERVE

Unfortunately, too many people just sign up for Social Security without realizing how many different alternatives exist. Even worse the Social Security Administration often gives faulty advice which can cost tens of thousands dollar or more over a recipient's lifetime.

You can start as early as age 62, but if you do then your benefit is reduced by 5/9ths for each of the first 36 months and 5/12ths for every month over that if you take it prior to Full Retirement Age (FRA).



The FRA is age 66 and 8 months currently. A \$1000 benefit at FRA is only \$717 at age 62. Additionally, if you are working and take the benefit before FRA and your earned income exceeds \$18,240, then your benefit is reduced dollar for dollar above this amount. There is no penalty once you reach FRA.

Then why would you even think about taking it early? You need the income, or you are in poor health and have a shortened life expectancy are two very good reasons.

On the other side of FRA, you might consider delaying until age 70. For each month after FRA you wait, your benefit increases by 0.66%. Thus, a \$1000 benefit at FRA could become \$1,266. If you do not need the income at FRA either because you are still working or have adequate cash flow, and especially if you anticipated a long life expectancy, then delaying might make sense.

If you are married for 10 years or more, you can take either 100% of your benefit, or 50% of your spouse's benefit whichever is higher. This option still applies, even if you are no longer married. Should the spouse with the higher benefit die, then the surviving spouse will get the higher benefit but lose their own benefit.

There is not enough room to delineate all of the alternatives and permutations. While the combinations are not endless, it can lead to over 500 ways to take Social Security according to www.bankrate.com. It is not something you want to do on your own. AN OUNCE OF PREVENTION FOR HURRICANE SEASON 2020

Benjamin Franklin was quite the wise man. In 1736, he famously penned "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" as an advisory to Philadelphians to prevent the many house fires of the era. Those few words neatly sum up the notion that it is far easier and better to stop a problem from happening than to stop or correct it after it has started.

Although we can't avoid natural disasters like hurricanes, we can reduce their negative impacts by preparing as much as possible, especially in the era of COVID-19. Knowing what you can do today, before the danger is near, is the key.

As always, having a personal preparedness plan in place is essential, but since things have changed over the last few months, you may now need to revise your plan.

The best place to start a plan or make sure your plan is up-to-date is to download Pinellas County's Hurricane Preparedness Guide - www.pinellascounty.org/emergency/allhazardguide.htm. The guide has everything you need to customize your family's preparedness plan, including tips to deal with the still-present danger of COVID-19.

One of the first things you will need to know is your evacuation level and if you will need to evacuate. During a storm, it is essential that people shelter in structures that are built to withstand the winds and are outside of the risk of storm surge. If you do have to evacuate, this year more than ever, consider staying with family or friends, in a hotel or motel, or, as a last resort, at a public shelter. If you don't have to evacuate and know someone who does, consider asking them to stay with your family during the storm. By doing that, you are helping create as much space as possible in our public shelters to maintain social distancing for those

with no other option.

Staying informed this year is very critical, as well. COVID-19 has presented many challenges that Pinellas County has had to adjust plans for, and new information emerges all the time. To help maintain social distancing, the Emergency Management team is currently updating the Pinellas hurricane shelter list to increase the amount of space allowed for each person or family. There may also be additional locations made available, known as non-congregant sites, and they are working though the details of this planning in conjunction with the State of Florida Division of Emergency Management. Please continue to check Emergency Management's website at www.pinellascounty.org/emergency for updates.



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WILLIAM DEAN CHOCOLATES How do they do that during a pandemic?

Unless you are new to the area, you have probably seen William Dean Chocolates. If you have not bought them yourself, chances are you have received a box, containing a wide array of artistic chocolates, as a gift.

William Dean Chocolates is owned by Bill Brown. It is named for two special men in his life: William his father and Dean was his grandfather. The chocolate company has been operating in Pinellas County for thirteen years - eight of those in Belleair Bluffs on the east end of the Bluffs Shopping Center.

Brown maintains the artisan's tradition of creating chocolates in small batches, without preservatives. "We only use the finest ingredients and make all our chocolates by hand in our shop here in Belleair Bluffs," explains Brown. The result is an edible work of art.

"Like most businesses, this year has been a challenge for us," says Brown. "2019 was our best year ever and then COVID-19 hit. We shut our store for two full months. We were still making and selling some of our specialties, but those sales came to us over the internet."

William Dean's sales fall into four main categories. Retail, his largest portion of sales, are the customers buying products in his store from the display areas. Corporate sales, 20% of his total, are businesses that buy products for employees and clients. During the Christmas season corporate orders come from all over the United States. Online sales are daily, but again peak a few weeks prior to Christmas. Wholesale sales involve places like restaurants who resell chocolates to their customers.

"During any year, our best months are November and December, naturally," Brown says. "Our slowest time is the summer—June through August. One-third of my sales come in during Christmas and one-third of those sales are from corporations," Brown adds.

"Chocolate, when frozen, can keep up to 6 months. Chocolate bars can easily last 6-8 months," Brown explains. "However, we do not keep product for more than two or three months. To prepare for the Christmas season, we start prepping in September and October. We do a lot of planning."

Remember all of William Dean's creations are done by hand, one-by-one.

For each season, they look at what and how much was ordered a year ago — Valentine's Day, Easter, Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas— each is different. "But with the pandemic all the past numbers are worthless. This year, Valentine's Day was okay because it was before the shut-down, but Easter was a wash. Unfortunately, no one knows what will happen by November and December of this year, but we need to start ordering for it soon."

Brown produces three different products in his Belleair Bluffs factory:

- 1. <u>Colorful Chocolates</u> The kind you see on display. They come in the special WD blue boxes and are 70% of his retail sales.
- 2. <u>Gelato</u> According to Brown, "You may not know it, but we sell a lot of gelato. It usually sells for \$5, however, due to pandemic restrictions we are not selling it now."
- 3. <u>Confectioneries</u> These are miscellaneous products such as candy bars and flavored popcorn.

Brown is constantly tweaking things. "We recently changed the packaging on some of gift boxes to see-through plastic," he says proudly. "In some cases, it increased the sales of those products by 500 percent! Those products have a long shelf life."

"We added a special new coffee espresso machine—just in time for the shut down," Brown says. "But for now, we can't have any lobby business to speak of, so we are not using it."

With the coffee machine, Brown had planned to offer a café-style breakfast with pastries, but that too, has temporarily been put on hold waiting for better days.

"Our Afternoon Tea was a big thing a few months ago," Brown says. "Most days, twenty or thirty people each paying \$15 or \$20 would enjoy our afternoon treats. That added \$600 a day to our bottom line. It too is on hold."

At the beginning of the year, William Dean employed between fifteen and twenty people. For the first few months after the shut-down started, Brown paid his staff, but he knew that could not go on forever. Today, Brown runs the entire store with two or three people including himself. "We do a lot of our production at night," says Brown. "During those days, we only have one person selling retail."

"We love being in Belleair Bluffs," Brown adds. "We have embraced the entire Belleair community and they seem to have embraced us."



"I've been an entertainer all my life," says Dallas Saupe. "It started in the 5th grade and just got bigger year by year. I learned to juggle when I was ten. I come from a family of entertainers and was always the class clown."

Dallas is the guy at Pier 60 Sunset Festival who juggles, escapes, and balances things on his head as he entertains the crowds most evenings at sunset. In the classical sense, he is a street performer, but he likes to be called a "busker" - a person who practices the art of "doing things (entertainment) in public to collect money."

Dallas was born into a military family in Delaware and was raised in Illinois. He lived in Clearwater Beach for 19 years and moved to Dunedin 6 years ago.

Growing up in a small Illinois town, everyone knew everyone. His yard was the neighborhood's playground. His brother, who was four years older, juggled and performed physical tricks and Dallas tried to keep up.

"The tricks and the juggling started as a hobby, something to do with friends," says Dallas.

Each winter, his high school had a Middle Ages/Renaissance themed "Madrigal Dinner." The kids put on a show while the parents ate an eight-course meal. The event featured all kinds of tricks and entertainment and Dallas and his brother's style were a perfect fit.

One year, his brother played the Court Jester. Following in his footsteps, Dallas played the Court Jester four years later.

"In junior and senior high schools, we performed at half time between basketball games," recalls Dallas. As a high school freshman, Dallas and his buddies won the school's talent show.

After high school, Dallas joined the Air Force Reserves and was stationed in Biloxi, Mississippi, a short hop from

New Orleans. "I was surprised how many street performers there were," says Dallas. "That is when I first realized you could make money at this".

In 1993, Dallas moved to Sarasota and got a real job. Nearby Bradenton, also known as "Circus Town," was where several circus performers spent the winter. One day, he saw an ad looking for jugglers with the "Roberts Circus." He was curious and went to watch. After watching the other guys try out, he borrowed some pins and showed them what he could do. The owner liked him, and Dallas literally ran away with the Circus.

The Roberts Circus was what they call a "Mud Show"—meaning they played a different city virtually every day. A year later after that got old, he moved to Clearwater. The City was in the process of creating its Sunsets at Pier 60. "Once again, I just went there just to see what it was all about," Dallas remembers.

"We had the pleasure of meeting Dallas, -also known at the human volcano, street performer extraordinariness, back in 1995. He was part of the opening team for our Pier 60 Concessions. Dallas was new to the area and worked part-time for our operation. During the evenings he would balance a lawn mower on his chin, with the grand finale of his 'human volcano' fire breathing as part of the Sunsets at Pier 60 Festival. Dallas has played a huge role in the success of the nightly sunset celebration. He is not only a seasoned entertainer, but more importantly a friend and someone who is passionate about Clearwater Beach," Lisa Chandler, Coordinator of Pier 60 Events explains.

The Pier 60 area was under construction and it was not anything like it is today. "The talent consisted of a juggler, named Dextre, and Wade Henry, a guy who juggled while riding a unicycle. Eventually, I was given the job of Busker Coordinator," says Dallas. "It was my job to find and review other entertainers."

"I have worked closely with Dallas, since 2000. He is an great asset to Sunsets Daily Festival. He always has the festival as his top priory. I look forward to working with him for many years to come," says Sunsets Pier 60 Manager Jean Hagen.

Today, Dallas and his oldest son Nick (28) work together at Pier 60. Even his youngest, The Great Carter (5) has a few tricks of his own.

"Traveling entertainers have a name for the venues where they perform - 'The Pitch.' My pitch is Pier 60," says Dallas. "The people here are honest, nice, and so appreciative—and I never have to worry about someone stealing my stuff."

"The best day I ever had was in 2015 the day after Christmas. Even though it was threating to rain and the crowds were small, the watchers were in the Christmas spirit. The people were very generous with their tips."

"America has become more of a cashless society. In general, this has hurt the tipping industry. People rarely carry cash and rely on credit cards and APPS. So, I have to have an APP on my cell phone to receive their tips."

"Those who come to the pier to watch sunsets are a mixed crowd. It has changed over the years and is probably 75% tourists and 25% locals. With the construction of new and more expensive hotels, the clientele has gone way up."

"I regularly perform at private events; businesses hire me for major corporate events. I do not do kids birthday parties—that is just not my thing. Sunsets at Pier 60 is my best event."

"On March 12th, the world as we know it changed due to Covid 19. Our festival shut down for three months and the entertainment still hasn't recovered. Many people have been forced to reinvent themselves. Nick and I don't get any satisfaction from doing Zoom or social media shows. We totally feed off the energy of a live audience. The Sunset Festival was allowed to reopen June 5th, but everyone must follow festival, city and CDC guidelines."

"For 30 years the goal was to get as many people as we could, as close together as possible. Not anymore. Now to do shows, we practice social distancing and cannot use audience participants in the show. Normally, in a street show, the audience is as big as a part of the show as the performer. But we are grateful we can perform, the three months without hearing laughter felt like a lifetime."

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CLEARWATER MARINE AQUARIUM NEWS

The Clearwater Marine Aquarium (CMA) unveiled their new Dolphin Habitat, the Ruth and J.O. Stone Dolphin Complex, where Winter and the other dolphins will live. The Ribbon Cutting took place at the end of July on the first floor of the complex. The complex, part of an \$80 million expansion project is the culmination of a fourteen-year dream of a state-of-the-art dolphin facility to house those dolphins who cannot be released back into the wild. Now, they have a forever home where they can enjoy a good and wholesome life in an enriched environment. The five pools in the complex, totaling 1.5 million gallons with nine viewing windows, were designed with the input and collaboration from some of the world's leading marine mammal veterinarians and scientists who provided their expertise. The Complex triples CMA's dolphin pool space, allowing for the care of additional rescued animals.

The nine viewing windows offer sweeping underwater views of all five residents Winter, Hope, PJ, Nicholas and Hemingway, including the 40-foot wide by 14-foot tall Kate Tiedemann and Ellen Cotton Main Dolphin Pool and Observation Window. It is also known as "The Window of Wonder." Weighing 52,000 pounds, it is one of the biggest acrylic windows in Florida!

Nicholas and Hemingway were the first dolphins to be relocated into the new pools. A few days later, Winter, Hope and PJ joined them in their pools. While these moves may seem like a non-event, they are not. It takes a great deal of pre-planning to orchestrate such relocations and the moves were made without incident through the coordination of their animal care team, dive team, veterinary team, facilities team, and volunteers.

"We are so excited to unveil this beautiful new space after fourteen years of planning and discussions," said CEO Frank Dame. "Each guest that comes through our doors allows us the ability to rescue, rehab, release, and care for our non-releasable resident marine animals." Dame continued, "With the additional capacity this beautiful and custom-made habitat affords us, we will be able to care for twice as many

rescued animals and give them the best care available."

This fall, CMA will open the third-floor access to the Stone Complex with views of Clearwater Beach and the top of the dolphin habitats. Additionally, Phase II of the expansion project will also include a new entrance experience, new dining areas with locally-sourced food options and beer and wine, a new retail area, private event space with a

ballroom and full prep kitchen, a high tech theatre, double the education space, four private meeting rooms, and fivetimes the guest space.

Due to the pandemic, all tickets, boat trip sales, and parking must be pre-purchased online or through a hotel front desk or concierge. Face coverings are required on site for all guests ages 5 and up. No exceptions permitted. Limited capacity is in effect to promote social distancing

CLEARWATER COUPLE MAKING FACE MASKS DURING THE PANDEMIC

In late February, as the Covid-19 pandemic began spiraling, Eva and Waldemar Kubiak watched the news with trepidation. Italy went on lock down, and our Surgeon General was telling people not to buy masks - we needed to save them for the front-line healthcare workers. The Kubiaks did some research and discovered a gaping hole in the U.S. market for medical face coverings.

In their early 20s, the Kubiaks had emigrated from Poland to Chicago. There, they developed several successful businesses, including a riverboat tour, a granite company, and several indoor soccer facilities. (In Poland, Waldemar was a professional soccer player.) Two years ago, they moved to the Sunshine State, settling in Clearwater Beach and opened The Clearwater Fun Boat and Summertime Boat Rentals at the Clearwater Beach Marina. The pandemic lockdown temporarily closed both businesses.

In researching mask production, the Kubiaks found over 80% of the medical face coverings sold in the U.S. are manufactured in China. With trade shut down by the



pandemic, Eva, whose mother was a nurse, felt an obligation to try and produce an alternative. "My grandparents survived World War II and my parents lived through communism in Poland. I felt like this (the pandemic) is MY war," she said. The couple decided to manufacture

masks and began to acquire the necessary machines and materials.

Eva reached out to Clearwater Mayor Frank Hibbard, who connected the Kubiaks with the City of Clearwater Economic Development Team, and the Pinellas County



Emergency Management Team. After several delays and roadblocks, the Kubiaks purchased the necessary machines and found a suitable manufacturing space at 2310 Tall Pines Drive in Largo. The next hurdle was locating the filtration materials for the three mask layers.

Outside China, the fabrics are only made in a handful of countries, with only two U.S. producers. It was important to the Kubiaks to source material domestically, and they were able to secure supply from both American companies. After receiving orders from Pinellas County and several private companies, production began and AmerMed was formed. It quickly grown to nine employees. They currently produce about 50,000 masks per day and can manufacture over 150,000 per day should demand increase. Their masks have completed two of three tests necessary for FDA approval and anticipate passing the third requirement shortly.

With the lock down over and tourism returning to Clearwater, the Kubiaks' boat businesses have reopened. Still, Eva and Waldemar hope to continue making a difference in the pandemic fight producing a quality product here in the United States.

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HAVE HAND SANITIZER DERMATITIS?

Our world has changed since the beginning of the New Year! We are now wearing masks, using cleaning products constantly and using lots of hand sanitizer!! Our skin takes a beating with all the alcohol based products that are designed to sanitize and kill bacteria and viruses on surfaces and on ourselves. Our hands are saying "Ouch!" to all the washing and wiping!



According to the CDC, a hand sanitizer must

have at least 60% alcohol to be effective against the Corona virus. Some products have more than 60%. That is a very high alcohol content to be bathing our hands in, over and over again.

Many people are finding their hands becoming dry, cracking and even bleeding, if it gets bad enough. And, those patients with Eczema will especially suffer as their hands will get very irritated and inflamed. What to do?

Well, first, we must keep up with the sanitizing and washing but, at the same time, let's think of ways to keep your hands comfortable while we work and take care of ourselves.

Keep your hands gloved while cleaning surfaces with cleansers or wipes. This will protect against some of the products. Change disposable gloves often.

Moisturize your hands after washing. Hyaluronic acid based moisturizers are great for keeping water content in the skin, but will not make your hands greasy. Neutrogena makes a good one called "Hydroboost." At night, you may want to try a heavier moisturizer like Aquaphor which will act as a protectant and barrier cream overnight. Aveeno also makes heavy duty moisturizers for people with Eczema, which are thicker and heavier for overnight healing.

Cortisone creams will help the itching and pain that can occur if your hands get really bad.

Over the counter cortisone might work, or you may need a stronger one from your dermatologist. Always put the cortisone cream on before your moisturizer. It will work best this way.

If you have eczema and your hands get REALLY bad with cracking and bleeding, you may need oral antibiotics from your doctor for a short period of time. This will help speed up the healing.

Remember, keep moisturizing and protect your hands! If hand dermatitis gets severe, it can be a difficult task to get hands back to a comfortable level, so prevention is the key! Keep moisturizers handy so you will not forget. Your hands will thank you!

Women's Dive Day was conceived in 2014 by members of the Professional Association of Dive Instructors, one of several internationally recognized SCUBA (Self Contained Underwater Breathing Apparatus) training and certification agencies. Six years and over 4000 international events later, Women's Dive Day was celebrated locally in an event that united several local dive charters, clubs, and associations, bringing almost 90 women (and a few guys) out to enjoy the underwater sites off the coast of Clearwater Beach.

Always one of the most popular dive days, the pandemic was an additional obstacle for event planners. Brian Mahardy of B. Mahardy Adventures, Mica Neal of Next Level Dive Club, and T.J Shea from 2Shea Charters organized and coordinated the day's events. Divers were split into morning and afternoon trips on local dive boats to maintain social distancing and ensure a safe experience. "We were a little worried about the logistics of an event of this size during these strange times," said organizer Mahardy, "But it's a testament to the strength

and versatility of today's participants that we were able recognize our local women's diving community safely, in accordance with CDC guidelines.

Divers met at Wet Lines Bait and Tackle at the KSK Marina in Clearwater and were divided among boats from 2Shea, Tanks-A-Lot, Off the Wall Adventures, Gulf Cat, and Gulfport Charters. Once everyone was geared up, the boats departed and headed for different dive locations such as the Veteran's Reef, Circle of Heroes, and

the Rube Allyn. The sites are all part of Pinellas County's Artificial Reef Program, begun by the Pinellas County Division of Solid Waste in 1975. It now consists of 42 artificial reefs made from inert debris including: concrete pipes, steel

beams, barges, and sunken ships.

The morning divers returned to the dock around noon and met with the afternoon group for a barbecue lunch. The second group then loaded up and headed out to get their dives in before the afternoon storms rolled through. The weather held out just long enough and everyone had a great time.

Brenda Letts and Erin Langenburg, two of the proprietors of Letts Dive!, a majority women-owned dive shop in St. Petersburg, brought a group of divers on the morning trip. "Women's Dive Day is a wonderful celebration of women in a sport that was, in the past, male dominated," said Langenburg. "At Letts Dive!, we celebrate women in diving every day with our Sisters of Sedna dive group – and I feel honored to be able to dive and connect with such a great group of women." (Sedna is the goddess of the sea and marine animals in Inuit mythology.)

CENSUS IS WRAPPING UP

Beginning in August, census takers will begin visiting homes to collect responses from those whom have not already responded to the 2020 census. Census takers will wear masks, follow local public health guidelines and take a virtual COVID-19 training before beginning to work in your neighborhood.

Census takers are hired from your area, and their goal is to help you and everyone in your home be counted in the 2020 Census. If the census taker who visits your home does not speak your language, you may request a return visit from a census taker who does speak your language. If no one is home when the census taker visits, the census taker will leave a notice of their visit with information about how to respond online, by phone or by mail. If someone visits your home to collect information for the 2020 Census, check to make sure they have a valid ID badge with their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date. A census taker will never ask for your social security information. Census workers may also carry Census Bureau bags and other equipment with the Census Bureau logo.

If you respond online or by phone today, a census taker is less likely to have to visit your home to collect your response

Clearwater Marine Aquarium (CMA) is excited to announce it has been selected by National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) to be the forever home to a new rescued male dolphin. The new dolphin will provide a companion for CMA rescued resident Nicholas, another male Atlantic bottlenose dolphin.

In July 2019, the Atlantic bottlenose dolphin stranded in shallow waters off Fiesta Key, Fla. When he was rescued, the dolphin was weak and was found to have severe pneumonia. After several weeks of treatment, the dolphin's health improved but further testing indicated he had hearing loss. Due to his ongoing health issues and hearing loss, NMFS ultimately determined the dolphin was not a candidate for release

Estimated to be approximately 26-years old, the dolphin weighs 700-pounds and has been named Hemingway. He joined Nicholas in CMA's new Dolphin Terrace.

MORTON PLANT VOLUNTEER MARY ELLEN OWEN CELEBRATES 100

When Mary Ellen Owen was born - May 31, 1920 - Woodrow Wilson was President. That was 100 years ago. She does not remember much about Wilson, but she does remember parts of the 1920s—and a lot more. She packed a lot of living over her 100 years.

She was born right at the end of WWI. Wilson had just established the League of Nations. J. Edgar Hoover was starting the FBI. Women gained the right to vote the same year. Radio, known as the "talking box," was gaining in popularity and had been used during the 1920 Presidential Election.

Mary Ellen was born in St. Louis. But because her father was a "traveling" minister for the Methodist church, she lived in many different cities, most of them in North Carolina.

As a 10-year-old, she remembers the Great Depression and the sacrifices everyone had to make. During the 1930s, she remembers people begging for food at her parents' back door. She remembers her dad's first car—a Model T. Later he owned a "Jewett", a larger, five-passenger car.

While growing up, she studied history and practiced drama. A talent scout once offered her a part in a film directed by David O. Selznick – turns out it was "Gone with the Wind." She passed on that opportunity.

In 1940, she attended Duke University. Then, the campus was divided into separate Men and Women's Colleges. While at Duke, she met, and at the age of 18, married Richard Owen. Dick, as he was known, later worked for the American Tobacco Company in North Carolina and Richmond, Virginia. He bought and sold tobacco.

After they were married, Dick joined the Navy to fight in WWII. Mary Ellen continued her studies at Duke.

After WWII, Mary Ellen did some print modeling in New York and runway modeling in Richmond, VA. She was a docent at the Virginia Museum. Through the years, she traveled to England, France, and Russia many times.

After Dick retired, he developed some health issues, leading the couple to decide to move to Florida. After sampling many cities, they settled on Belleair Bluffs in 1970. This also put them close to their son Richard, who lives in Dunedin.

They were the very first to buy a condominium in the Harbour Club's Building A overlooking the Intracoastal. Mary Ellen has lived in that same unit now for 50 years.

Not one to just sit around, Mary Ellen got involved in her local community. She joined The National Society of Arts and Letters, the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), and the Pinellas Republican Women's Club. She is a Tri-Delta alumnus, member of the First United Methodist Church and a longtime member of the Belleair County Club and its Book Club.

"Mary Ellen has been a member of this club for 43 years and I have known her for 23," says Ed Shaughnessy, Belleair Country Club's General Manager. "I knew her husband - a true gentleman before he passed away. She was very devoted to him and brought him to the club in his wheelchair many times for years before he passed. Her positive attitude, congenial personality and beautiful smile make her pleasant to be around. She is strong-minded,

soft-hearted, and pleasantly old fashioned. Mary Ellen is deeply religious, and the world is blessed to have her influence for over a century."

Mary Ellen takes credit for naming the small park to the west of Harbour Club condos - Pelican Park - the first park Belleair Bluffs ever developed.

"When Dick got sick, he spent a lot of time at Morton Plant Hospital," says Mary Ellen. "I was so pleased with the way they treated him, I wanted to give them something back."

Twenty years ago, she started volunteering at Morton Plant. "I have done everything from working in the gift shop to working in the surgical waiting room and hosting the front desk."

"When you are around Mary Ellen, there is a certain aura," says Vicki Pikal, her Morton Plant Hospital Guest Services boss. "When she goes home, she leaves

some of that aura with us. She has the patience of a saint."

"In the beginning, I was there three days a week, then two and recently only one. I gave up my car a few years ago, and another volunteer would pick me up for my weekly shift," explains Mary Ellen.

Mary Ellen volunteered right up until March when the COVID-19 shutdown started, and Morton Plant Hospital temporarily furloughed all their outside volunteers. She is anxious to be called back to work.

Her 100th Birthday Celebration

Her birthday in May was full of surprises. Still practicing "Safer at Home," that morning her neighbors did a "walk-by parade" leaving cards and a cake at her front door. They all gathered at the pool so she could see them waving to her with signs and balloons.

In the afternoon, she went to Dunedin to spend time with her son, Richard (79) and his wife, Eby. To honor her, friends from DAR, Morton Plant and her church coordinated a birthday parade down his street, which also included fire trucks and Sheriff cars.

In addition to her son, she has two grandchildren, six great grandchildren, and two great great grandchildren.

Her son, Richard, sums her up best. "I am blessed to have had a mother like her. She has certainly led a very happy and diverse life."



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
