Ralph Finke Was IRB's Barefoot Mayor

Ralph Finke was a mayoral two-timer. That is, he was the Mayor of Indian Rocks Beach at two different times—first in the 1960s and again in the 1980s. Combined, he was elected to four two-year terms.

In 1922, Ralph was born in Birmingham, Alabama, where he was raised. In 1943, he joined the Army's Air Corps and became a pilot. He flew a P-51 Mustang and was one of the first pilots to ever fly a jet airplane-the F-80 "Shooting Star."

After his service in the Air Corps, Finke moved to Tampa, went to Tampa College, and got a General Contractors license He started a masonry company before moving to Indian Rocks Beach, in 1951. Here he and his wife, Avril, raised their four children - Rodney, Kennan, Karen, and Roy.

Finke proceeded to build "anything that brought in some money—houses, commercial buildings; he even cleared land," says his oldest son, Rodney. "He built many houses in Indian Rocks and some in Largo. Some he built for the family to live in, others were homes he was hired to build." - Continued on page 3



The first of the family's homes Ralph built was on 18th Avenue. In 1959 he built their house on La Hacienda Drive. It was his "dream home" with air conditioning, a central vacuum system, an intercom in each room and a buzz-in front door lock—amenities way ahead of the times.

"Things went pretty well until the real estate bust in 1960," remembers Rodney. "Dad's company went broke and he took a job managing a convenience store. He also picked up miscellaneous jobs that allowed him to use his construction background, or his dump truck and tractor."

In 1958, people began to encourage him to run for the City Commission; he did - and he won. In those days, the commission and mayor position had no salary. In 1960, he was elected Mayor and was re-elected again in 1962. He served for two terms (1960 to 1964).

"He became known as the Barefoot Mayor," Rodney says, "because he came to the meetings and events not wearing any shoes."

Ralph Finke was also very involved in the Indian Rocks community. He was a volunteer fireman, coached Little League, was a Commander of the IRB American Legion (they once owned the Beach Art Center building), and he was very involved with the local Civic Association.

In 1968, Dad was nearly broke." says Rodney. "Indian Rocks needed a new Postmaster when Frank Brandon retired after 26 years. Dad was friends with Congressman Bill Young, who asked President Lyndon Johnson to appoint him the Postmaster, which he did. He held that position for 20 years."

"I remember Ralph well," says longtime resident Carol McGlaughlin. "One day I accidentally dropped some

important papers in a Post Office blue box in front of Archies Grocery store. I called and Ralph, the postmaster, personally came down and opened the box for me. That is one of the benefits of living in a small town like Indian Rocks Beach."

Ralph made a run for the Florida House but lost. In 1984, between Frank Proctor and Ed Piniero's terms, he ran and was elected Mayor again. He served two more terms, before leaving office in 1988, The same year he retired as Postmaster. Ralph died in 1993 at age 71.

Beach Toy boxes are located at the 4th, 8th, 17th, 22nd, 24th and 27th IRB Beach Accesses.



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CUSTOM JEWELRY BY ROBERT YOUNG HOW DOES HE DO THAT?

Hi, It's Robert Young here. I have been designing and creating custom, one-of -a-kind fine jewelry pieces for almost 50 years. With such a long time doing this, there are probably enough of my creations out there to fill a pickup truck with cool pieces. Many of you may already be enjoying my jewelry or are likely too, or know someone who does.

Exactly what is custom jewelry? Well for me, it is not simply ordering a bunch of parts nor pre-made stock molds from a manufacturer. That might be "custom" for some, but I have something more interesting in mind. Ever since getting started designing jewelry, it has been amazing that I can imagine a work of art and bring the design into fruition using gold and platinum. Although some of these designs are just those using metals themselves, most of my pieces feature gemstones, either those that I provide or those of my clientele. It is a great way to incorporate family gems or to reinvigorate tired pieces you already have.

Ok, so how does this "Custom Design Process" work? I realize that the idea of trusting me to create some fabulous and valuable treasure is sometimes unnerving. I know it is often difficult to feel comfortable about the custom design process - especially since it starts only on paper.



Since I am not a mind reader, I am always concerned with finding out from you what you want. You will find, I am really good at that! It is kind of an interview. It is personal because jewelry is personal, so much more so than ordering new kitchen cabinets. And often there is so much more at stake. The piece that I am going to design for you might be your lifetime wedding and engagement rings, maybe it is a special pendant to hold your mom's diamond or it might be a present for someone you love. Yeah, I know that a jewelry gift is always for someone you love. That is what makes jewelry so important to you and to me.



Recently, besides the wedding and engagement items there have been many graduation presents and "Push Presents," you know, a special gift to your wife commemorating your family's new arrival. Some of these "Push Presents" are as you might expect - diamonds, but it is also a great opportunity to design something incorporating a birthstone gem.

In order to explore design possibilities and so that both you and I understand what to expect, we will look among my showcase pieces and through the multitude of original designs on my computer for inspiration.

If you are interested, I will show you through a significant collection of colored gemstones, diamonds, and pearls.

To crystallize your design concept, I will sketch an actual size color rendering showing you exactly what to expect.

Since this design activity is a process, it takes some time. Often you will sit across from me while I draw numerous actual size renderings. And often too, I will draw more designs after our first meeting to better show you additional drawings after thinking about it some. Yes, it is a process that requires thinking. We can put our heads together and I will be able to create a concept that can be a perfect design for you. All this is not scary at all, as I have done this throughout my professional career. I am very patient and I listen very well, and I am extremely easy to talk with. I speak a plain language and you will get some great conversation - yeah, humor too!

Importantly, as we are discussing your design, we will consider costs; most design ideas provide flexibility in order to best fit your pocket. Again, this is not scary. Jewelry is important, but so is your budget! After you choose a design, we determine a price based upon design, materials, and the work involved.

Our turnaround time is usually about three weeks. Once we decide on a finished delivery date, I keep to that schedule.


In order to be able to create these works of art, there are of us working as a team. Lena Sanford keeps everything in order and creates a very hospitable store environment. At our goldsmith's bench is Mark McKinlay, a true master craftsman. He is responsible for just about every treasure created in our studio. If you wish, you can view the progress of your piece as it evolves.

Some of the designs are forged and soldered directly from the metal itself. Others are created using the "Lost Wax Process." Lost wax casting has been a metallurgic technique used for millennia. Even King Tut's golden mask was created this way about 1300B.C. (How's that for old school?) I will be happy to show you around our workshop to explain how these treasures are realized.

There is something else that I haven't let you in on yet - I love this jewelry creating process. My appreciation for Art, for Processes and my true interest in you will be apparent from the start. This is a fun and rewarding job!



Earlier I said that I was not a mind reader, but why not stop in to see if maybe I am just a wee bit clairvoyant while creating a design for you that you will love for a very long time.





BETTER TO GIVE

As we approach the holiday season, our thoughts turn to gifts for family and friends. Here are a few thoughts on financial gift giving.

In 2020, you may make a gift up to \$15,000 each to as many people as you want without incurring a gift tax. A couple can double that amount. Let us say you have three children. That means you jointly can transfer \$90,000 of wealth to them and another \$90,000



to their spouse and \$30,000 to each grandchild.

But it gets even better! Suppose you do this over a five-year period. If the child invests the money at a hypothetical return of 5%, it will be worth \$165,750 for each. In ten years, it will grow to \$377,300 and in twenty years it will almost reach \$1 million. But it gets even better! If you have a grandchild attending private school or going to college and you make a gift directly to the institution for qualified educational expenses, regardless of how high, the gift is unlimited.

But it gets even better! In the alternative, you can contribute to a 529 education account that grows tax free when used for qualified education expenses. You can jump start this program by putting in five years of gifting at one time. The only catch here is that you cannot make an additional gift for the subsequent five years.

But it gets even better! Suppose you have a great deal of wealth and you want to give more than \$15,000 per year. Say you are age 65, expect to live at least another twenty years, and you want to give \$1 million. Then the first \$15,000 will be considered an annual gift and the remaining amount will use part of your lifetime exemption of \$11.58 million. There is still no gift tax, but you will have to file a gift tax return.

But it gets even better! That million dollars over the next 20 years at our 5% return grows to \$2.65 million. Thus, you removed not \$1 million from your future estate, but \$2.65 million. Assuming you have a taxable estate, this could save over \$1 million in potential estate taxes.

30 YEARS OF THE PINELLAS TRAIL

Before there was a Pinellas Trail, walkers, runners, bikers, and skaters took their chances on our streets. It took the death of a young man on the Belleair Causeway to create the Pinellas Trail.

In 1983, Indian Rocks residents Bert and Patti Valery's son, Albert Valery Jr. was hit and killed on the bridge while bicycling coming home from his part-time job. The accident led his parents to create the Bicycle Advisory Committee and to lobby the Metropolitan Planning Organization for safer roads and pathways.

It took five years of relentless petitioning and campaigning, visiting and presenting to dozens of local municipalities, and twisting the arms of politicians and county department heads before the concept of a linear park, a recreational trail, a green ribbon running through the county—took form. In the late 1980s, it was suggested that it be paid for by Penny For Pinellas and The Pinellas Trail was born.

On December 1, 1990, the first five miles of the trail opened at Taylor Park in Largo (at 8th Avenue) and stretched south to Seminole City Park. It would eventually become today's 54 miles of connected roadway, reserved exclusively walkers, bicyclists, and skaters.

In 2003, the Pinellas Trail was designated as part of a National Recreational Trail within the National Trails System by the United States Department of the Interior and the National Parks Service and has twice received the "Best Trail of Florida" award from the State Office of Greenways and Trails.


Although the original trail was started with money from Penny For Pinellas, County, State and Federal agencies have invested more than \$63 million in expanding and improving the trail over the past 30 years. In 2022, when the San Martin Bridge/Trail is finished, connecting Roosevelt Blvd and 4th Street, the full loop will be complete.

In the last five years, there have been many improvements including:

- 1. Pedestrian bridge over Orange Street and Alt US 19
- Tri County trail connection trail spur completion of Pinellas County gap to Coast to Coast Trail
- 3. Clearwater Trail connection at Druid
- 4. Pedestrian bridge replacement over Alligator Creek at Northeast Coachman Park
- 5. NE Coachman Rd trail completion
- Trail completion between US 19 pedestrian overpass to Sunset Point Rd
- 7. Trail completion between Sunset Point Rd and NE Coachman Rd
- Trail completion along Belleair Rd and US 19 to Haines Bayshore
- 9. Reconstruction in Tarpon Springs near Live Oak St
- 10. Trail resurfacing in Dunedin and Ozona
- 11. Construction beginning for North Loop Gap between Enterprise Rd and John Chesnut Park. When done, this 6.8 miles will complete the northern gap.
- 12. Trail completion along Roosevelt Blvd
- 13. Installation of drinking fountains and benches

In the beginning, only three other places had any form of a community trail. Today, over 1,000 cities have them. Almost all have asked Pinellas County for input or visited to see our now famous Pinellas Trail.

DEFYING THE REAL ESTATE ODDS If I Were a Betting Man

A pandemic. High unemployment. Tourism struggling. Businesses shuttering. Economy stuttering. All that points to a real estate market that, by all rights, should be in the very bottom of the tank. Instead, we are dealing with a blazing market that even a well-trained, long-distance runner is hard-pressed to keep up with and the reason realtor.com's "Market Hotness Index" exists.

After COVID arrived, the bottom dropped out of the real estate market in April. If I had been asked then to put money on Indian Rocks meeting last year's year-end sales figures, I would not have anteed up. But, by the looks of the pace at which our market is roaring back, I probably should have taken that bet...and maybe even doubled down.

In the first five months of last year with no pandemic, 85 homes and condos were sold in IRB. This year, during the same months in the grip of COVID, there were only 55 sales, putting us about 35% behind the 8-ball as of May 31. Now, roll the calendar forward to October. As of mid-October, the market rebounded to within 5 units of 2019's sales! And, if 4th Quarter follows the pattern of the last three years, we'll be raising our champagne glasses in a New Year's toast to a real estate market that is at least on par with last year as we say good riddance to 2020—with glee.

Property values have defied the odds, too. Nationally, the median sales price of a home exceeded \$300,000 for the first time in history. In IRB, the median sales price as of mid-October was \$595,000--nearly double the national stat and an increase of 20% when compared to the same 10.5 months last year.

Two reasons our real estate market escaped the tank: (1) a lack of inventory against pent-up demand and (2) super low interest rates producing the highest volume of new mortgages/refis in 30 years. How fast our properties are selling tells the story. The median number of days from listing to contract in 2019 was 47. This year, the median number of days a property is listed before going to contract is 27. We recently presented 10 offers to one seller with an aggressively priced property: 6 were AT LIST PRICE and 4 were OVER, resulting in a contract after only 5 days on the market.

The resiliency of our real estate market has amazed even the most optimistic. It took IRB years to recover from the Great Bubble Burst of 2007 but we're springing back from the Pandemic of 2020 in short order. A deluge of foreclosures isn't likely either since, surprisingly, a significant percentage of stressed borrowers got back on track.

Most economists and real estate experts expect ongoing growth at least into 2021. Scarce inventory will, more than likely, continue to offset health and economic concerns and keep the market steered toward sellers. Our strong housing sector is leading economic recovery and, if I were sitting at the blackjack table deciding whether to press up my bet, I'd move all my chips forward and go all in.

On Street Parking: The first ordinance will restrict on street parking east of Gulf Blvd. and north of 5th Avenue. Only residents with a valid parking permit decal will be allowed to park on the street from 9am to 5pm. All residents are eligible to have a free decal for each vehicle with a registration reflecting an address within the City. Contractors that are actively providing services, or repairs are exempt from these restrictions. Violators will be fined and or towed.

<u>Parking Fines:</u> The second ordinance adjusts parking fines from \$40 to \$75. It also restricts parking on the beach accesses, including spaces reserved for residents, between the hours of 11pm and 6 am to vehicles with temporary parking permits. The temporary permits are \$5 per night.

<u>No Trace Ordinance</u>: The third ordinance – called the No Trace Ordinance - is to keep the public beach and beach access areas free from personal obstructions. It states:

- Holes dug on the beach are required to be attended and filled prior to leaving the beach.
- Personal property cannot be left unattended on any portion of the public beach from 10 pm until 6 am. It will be deemed abandoned by the owner and removed.
- Open fires on the beach are prohibited

<u>Park Hours -</u> The final ordinance changes park hours. All parks in the city, except for the Beach Nature Preserve, the Indian Rocks Beach Skate Facility, and Brown Park, will be closed from 9 pm to 7 am daily. This includes Kolb and Keegan Clair Parks. Brown Park, the Nature Preserve and the Boardwalk will be closed from dusk until 7 am. The Keegan Clair Boat Docks will be open daily 7 am - 11pm. The skate facility at Kolb Park will be open daily 10am – 9pm.

The meeting begins at 7pm, with limited seating. For residents who wish to view the meeting from home, the City has Zoom information available. If you are unable to attend, but want to express your views regarding any of the above ordinances, you can email the Commissioners through the City's Web site at www.indian-rocks-beach.com.

SEASONAL RECLAIMED WATER RESTRICTIONS IN EFFECT

Pinellas County seasonal reclaimed water restrictions are in effect through Monday, Nov. 30. Enforcement of watering restrictions is currently being intensified to encourage responsible use of reclaimed water.

North County reclaimed water customers may irrigate two days per week based on property address:

- Addresses ending in an even number (0, 2, 4, 6, or 8) may water Tuesday and/or Saturday.
- Addresses ending in an odd number (1, 3, 5, 7, or 9) may water Wednesday and/or Sunday.
- Parcels with mixed or no address, such as common areas associated in subdivisions, may water Wednesday and/or Sunday.
- Watering is prohibited between 8 am and 4 pm on authorized days.

Because irrigation is prohibited on Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays, the reclaimed water system will be shut down on these days, as needed. The system will also be shut down from 8 am to 4 pm on all days of operation for supply recovery.



WATER WISE

I love working in my garden. I find great peace working there and my focus has been on planting native plants and attracting pollinators. I became a Master Gardener in 2015 and have applied those skills to benefit the community as well. In a Master Gardener UF/IFAS Pinellas County Update, I learned about Community Water Wise Awards Program for 2020. I cleaned out my six rain barrels and started to water all my plants in my yard exclusively from the



collected rain water. Having no grass in my yard it requires less water and very little pesticides and herbicides. Since June I have been looking at my water bill and I have reduced my water consumption by half from the year before.

The Community Water Wise Awards Program is sponsored by Tampa Bay Water and was created to recognize individuals and businesses committed to conserving water resources and protecting the environment by implementing the Florida-Friendly Landscaping™ principles. The deadline to apply was August 31st. If you are interested in more information or applying for next year check out awards.tampabaywaterwise.org.

Everyone has a role to play in conserving our drinking water resources. To help our region conserve water, Tampa Bay Water is partnering with our member governments and the Southwest Florida Water Management District on Tampa Bay Water Wise, a regional water conservation program that offers rebates to residents, commercial property owners, contractors and builders who take proactive steps to reduce water use and demand on the region's water supply. TIPS TO AVOID GAS STATION CREDIT CARD SKIMMERS

Do a Scan: Take a close look at gas pumps to see if they have been opened, are damaged, unlocked, or if tamper-evident security tape has been cut or removed.

Pay with a Credit Card: If you must use a debit card, choose to use it as credit, instead of selecting debit and entering your PIN. Use a credit card chip if available

Pay Inside Instead Of At The Pump: It takes just seconds for criminals to place a skimmer in a gas pump, but it is far less likely that a skimmer has been placed on a terminal in front of the clerk inside.

Choose Gas Pumps Closest To The Building: Do not use gas pumps out of the attendant's line of sight, such as those around a corner or behind a building. Thieves don't choose pumps where the attendant may catch them in the act.

Check You Statements Regularly For Fraudulent Activity: Nearly every credit card issuer offers fraud alerts.

If you suspect your card has been compromised, immediately contact your financial institution and local law enforcement.

PINELLAS CONSTRUCTION INDUSTRY REALITIES

As I've spent time writing informational articles these past 4 years while contemplating the robust construction activity in Pinellas County, I keep going back to recurring concepts that I've discussed because they provide the most accurate information that I feel I can provide. 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MORTON PLANT HOSPITAL'S STRUCTURAL HEART CLINIC ADAPTS TO SERVE PATIENTS DURING PANDEMIC

Sitting in their home in St. Simons Island, Ga and staring at a screen on a random Wednesday afternoon, Jack and Lynda Sterrett weren't just watching television or checking email. They were "at" Jack's follow-up appointment with Joshua Rovin, MD, FACS, Cardiovascular Surgeon and Medical Director, Center for Advanced Valve and Structural Heart Care at Morton Plant Hospital.

Rewind the clock a few months and this follow up would have been in-person at the structural heart clinic. Though some primary care visits were happening via telemedicine, heart patients typically were seen in-person. Then came COVID-19, changing business as usual around the world and at Morton Plant Hospital.

Though most transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR) surgeries, like Jack's, were delayed in March when BayCare postponed elective surgeries, the need to evaluate and possibly treat patients did not disappear. Heart issues did not go away, and some needed immediate treatment.

When BayCare offered physicians the telemedicine option, the structural heart team didn't hesitate. They recognized the opportunity this presented offering patients the care they needed while keeping them safe during a pandemic. Within a day, the team was seeing patients using BayCareAnywhere®, a telemedicine healthcare app that individuals can download to a smartphone or tablet.

Patients and families who would have been in the office were now on a large screen while a cardiologist, a surgeon and a nurse practitioner sat together discussing the patient's condition and medical history.

While many structural heart clinics across the nation closed in April, telemedicine allowed Morton Plant's clinic to continue meeting the needs of its patients. In April, the clinic saw more than 90 percent of its patients using telemedicine.

Being out in front is nothing new to Morton Plant's structural heart team. They brought TAVR surgery to the Tampa Bay area in 2012, and in the ensuing years, the team has performed more than 1,500 surgeries while keeping abreast of the latest breakthroughs to ensure each patient has the best hope for a successful outcome.

While telemedicine may seem minor

compared to the complex surgeries that have been performed and medical strides that have been made, the team recognized that a successful outcome had to start with an initial visit that kept the patient comfortable and safe.

"Technology gave us the opportunity to continue to provide our experience and expertise to help individuals with heart valve disease even during a worldwide pandemic," said Rovin.

Not only did the team consider patient safety when offering telemedicine, but it also made patient satisfaction a priority. The clinical team, of the structural heart program, creates a BayCareAnywhere® account for patients and sends them an email with all their information. The patient simply opens the email and clicks the link. Someone on the team also calls the patient to walk through the process and offers to do a test call if it makes the patient more comfortable.

"We can use telemedicine to see patients for all appointments except the one closest to the surgery," said John Ofenloch, MD, cardiovascular surgeon and chief of cardiothoracic surgery at Morton Plant Hospital. "This help provide a level of comfort for many patients."

While all patients, unless otherwise requested, continue to have a one-week follow-up appointment via telemedicine, most patients have resumed coming in-person for the initial consultation. That doesn't necessarily mean less use of telemedicine as the team continues to find new ways to use technology to satisfy patients.

Many patients want more than one family member to participate in the consultation, but guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention only allow one visitor with the patient. The team has begun to bring the additional family members into the visit virtually. They can see the clinicians in the examination room, ask questions and offer information to help the doctors make a better decision.

Putting the patient's needs first has always been one of the driving forces of those who are a part of the Structural Heart Clinic.

"From the outset, we have stuck to a multi-disciplinary approach with a

cardiologist, a heart surgeon and one or two nurse practitioners working as a team to assess each patient," said Rovin. "Then, the surgeons and cardiologists meet weekly to discuss each case and decide the best option for the patient."

Technology has begun to play into this as well. If someone cannot be at the team meeting in person, they can join via Microsoft Teams, adding additional knowledge and experience to each patient review.

"The benefit for our team is that the cardiologist and doctor who saw the patient will present the case to the other 10 people on the team to get everyone's opinion," said Michael Kayatta, MD, cardio thoracic surgeon and member of the Morton Plant Hospital Valve Clinic Team.

Many may think the use of telemedicine means a less personal approach, but patients at Morton Plant Hospital's Center for Advanced Valve and Structural Heart Care would disagree.

Just ask Jack. Originally scheduled for April 1, his TAVR had to be postponed until May 5 because of the halt to elective surgeries. "They called weekly to check on me and everything was perfect," he said. He reported he had almost no recovery. He spent eight days total in Florida, and within a week of returning to Georgia, he was back to walking three miles each day.

Speaking up on the screen in the office, he told his team, "You guys have been wonderful. Thank you."

This is especially difficult for the Foundation because the event generates a significant part of our annual revenue, so we are going to have to find ways to cover that loss revenue if possible.

We still have a number of smaller events on our schedule for this Fall, Winter and Spring, so watch for information on them. We are also on target to break ground for the new Children's Discovery Garden in December and are still working diligently to raise the balance of the funds needed for construction and programming for that Garden.

We will be sprucing up the Gardens a bit for the holidays and invite you to come during the day to enjoy the Gardens in all of their winter beauty. We will plan to be back in 2021 bigger and better and will be looking for volunteers to help with the planning and implementation starting in March 2021


THINGS I DIDN'T EXPECT WHEN I JUMPED OUT OF AN AIRPLANE

Would you ever jump out of an airplane? For me, at 55, it was a distant thought on my fantasy bucket list! But last Saturday there I was, driving to the Lake Wales Regional Airport to the "Jump Florida" Skydiving Center with my kids and neighbors, on my daughter's 18th birthday, presumably to only WATCH! The week before I had sincerely tried to psyche myself up but I was truly scared, even having nightmares and losing sleep the days before. I didn't want to do it. But upon arrival to the huge airport hanger with 100+ people waiting to go, and large live stream videos showing the entire process, I soon developed a sense of calm and I began to believe it was not such a difficult feat. I signed up and I did it!

Here are the Top 3 things I did not expect when jumping out of the plane.

- 1. Absolutely No Skills are Involved: The Tandem instructor does absolutely everything! He attaches the harness, he jumps, he pulls the parachute, and he does the landing. My job was to relax and realize that I am like another backpack he was carrying. There is nothing for you to do.
- 2. You Don't Feel the Fall... You feel the Wind: Many people believe you get that roller-coaster drop feeling the entire time you are going down. But actually, that stomach drop feeling is caused by a change in acceleration and you only feel that feeling for a few seconds immediately after the jump. Instead, once you jump, the extreme wind in your hair, face, mouth, and body will be a memorable experience. Also, at 18,000 feet, you are so far above the earth that it doesn't look like the ground is coming toward you very quickly. And after the parachute is pulled, it is a slow, graceful, and very peaceful glide to the ground where you lift your feet up and the Instructor softly lands on his feet or bottom.



We went to Florida Jump Skydive who NEVER had an accident report in over 125,000+ jumps. That gave me a lot of reassurance!! If you decide to Skydive, do your research and always be safe. It is appropriate for any age 18-100. For us, it was a great family experience and a fabulous memory that will last a lifetime.



Such is Daryl May's sequel "The Whole Shootin' Match."



He performed on cruise ships, Australian ski resorts, wrote a hit song for recording artist Mel Tillis, and got waylaid with Harry Bee, a Jewish harmonica player, during a shooting coup in Haiti. Jack Daniels even made him an honorary Tennessee Squire.

Through the end of the year, we will honor requests for holiday meals of frozen turkeys, boxed stuffing, canned gravy, instant potatoes, green beans, and cranberry sauce. If you would like to help, we accept donations in the blue barrel outside the pantry door at any time. Give your goods to a volunteer from 10 am and Noon on Wednesdays or 5 to 7 pm on Thursdays. The church office also accepts nonperishable donations from 9 am to 1 pm, Monday through Thursday.



REIMAGINED 2020 CLEARWATER JAZZ HOLIDAY & INNOVATIVE OUTREACH

The tradition continues in its 41st year with a creative, live music series of small-scale, socially-distanced, and mostly open-air events starting October 15th.

"It's been a challenging year and very emotional for our family of support especially coming off our 40th year," says Steve Weinberger, Clearwater Jazz Holiday Foundation CEO.

"In the face of all the uncertainty, we simply dug in and got creative, adapting many of our education and outreach programs, and carefully evaluating various strategies for live events when the timing was right. Looking back over what feels like the longest year ever, we are so proud of, and inspired by, what we have accomplished, and we're ready to celebrate again with our fans."

Clearwater Jazz Holiday would have celebrated its 41st festival October 15-18 in Clearwater's Coachman Park.

"While we cannot do the traditional large-scale festival format this year, we feel we have put together something special that will keep the tradition alive, support local musicians, and help to increase awareness of our community programs which continue to make a meaningful impact."

The jazzfest organizers just recently launched "CJH Presents Wanderlust," a reimagined, live, in-person, music series, at various venues (in creative, mostly open-air settings) spanning mid-October through the end of the year, "and maybe beyond," adds Weinberger as he describes 11 of these small-scale events already confirmed.

There are six private beach events where attendees enjoy the music from socially distanced pods of lounge chairs, two rooftop concerts where fans purchase tables on a beautiful open air terrace overlooking the intracoastal waterway and Sand Key bridge, and three special engagements with Ruth Eckerd Hall.

"We've all be confined for so long, worried, and working hard. We know how moving, powerful and healing music can be and the magic of a shared music experience. That is Wanderlust. It is a creative opportunity to get out, explore a little, and go find the music again."

And like the larger scale annual festival, the lineup offered is fun, festive, and diverse with some wonderful gems.

Weinberger walks us through the billing: "We have local fan favorites, The Back Honkeys, Reverend Barry & The Funk, Ronnie Dee & The Superstars, The Ries Brothers, Have Gun Will Travel, Gloria West and The Gents, Ashley Smith & The Random Occurrence and Sarasota Slim

- some great jazz sets from The Latin Jazz Knights, Kyle Schroeder and the Reinhardt/George Group, a La Lucha 80's party featuring James Suggs and Ona Kirei, and a series of trios fronted by Jeremy Carter, Austin Vickrey, Pete Carney, Karen Benjey, Valerie Gilespie, and Brandon Robertson."

The Wanderlust Series also treats CJH fans to three very special engagements at Ruth Eckerd Hall's intimate but spacious Kate Tiedemann & Ellen Cotton Cabaret Theatre, including Carl Fischer's Sunshine City (Billy Joel's longtime trumpeter) and a very limited number of VIP Jazz Holiday secondrow tables for back-to-back Chick Corea solo shows: "Chick Corea Solo Piano: From Mozart to Monk." The VIP tables include a special Chick Corea charcuterie tray, tableside service, and a signed CD for each person.


The Wanderlust Series also celebrates Clearwater Jazz Holiday Foundation's continued cultural impact in Tampa Bay and beyond. Its innovative adaptations such as the Young Lions Jazz Master "Virtual" Sessions, Stop-Time Series with Frank Williams, Drum Roll: Fun with Jazz & Drums, and others have served to continue the mission, enhance traditional programs, and support musicians who deliver the experiences.



Young Lions Jazz Master "Virtual" Sessions The program engages musicians to offer live instrument sessions for beginners of all ages or those getting reacquainted with their instrument as well as Master Class Sessions designed for intermediate/advanced players and professionals. Sessions are offered at no cost, use the Zoom platform, and are approximately 45 minutes in length.

The Foundation also developed a rich and growing video archive of the recordings of these sessions. At the "THE STUDIO" students can watch the full recordings and take advantage of other free materials.

There are over 80 sessions since early May with more scheduled, over 600 live participants, and a rotating cast of incredible musicians and educators from near and far, including Wycliffe Gordon,



Frank Williams, Jeff Rupert, Valerie Gillespie, Dan Miller, Pete Carney, Michelle Mailhot, and James Suggs.

STOP-TIME SERIES with Frank Williams
This new initiative complements CJH's popular History of Jazz Outreach program which has impacted over 30,000 students since 2012 with a free comprehensive visual and audio History of Jazz archive delivered in Frank's one-of-a-kind style.

Visitors can also enjoy listening to the Young Lions virtual sessions and the Stop-Time Series as part of our Young Lions Jazz Master "Virtual" Sessions Podcast available on most major platforms. There are already over 2,000 total plays on the podcast.

Weinberger shares, "These new resources are so inspirational. Not only are we regularly supporting musicians and educators with these programs, but I truly feel it is a labor of love for everyone involved. As we are watch this treasure grow, it is exciting to see it all positioned to benefit thousands of students and really people of all ages."

Other Jazz Holiday virtual adaptations include a special guitar series for students in neighborhood family centers in economically challenged areas and a drum program themed around the history of rhythm, drums and Jazz to inspire early elementary school students. The Clearwater Jazz Holiday Foundation shows no signs of slowing down with talks of additional tweaks to its traditional programming and some more new programs, too.

"Like many, we have a lot of challenges to overcome, but with the continued help from our cooperate and outreach partners, volunteers, donors and fans, we will continue to inspire, educate, and make a meaningful impact. We just need to continue with the creativity, dream big, and work together – and we will keep the tradition alive for generations to benefit and enjoy."
