

ST. JEROME CATHOLIC CHURCH 70 years of service

While today, St Jerome Catholic Church is in Largo, it first opened here in Indian Rocks Beach in 1951. Initially, it was an expansion of St. Cecelia in Clearwater, within the Diocese of St. Augustine. St. Cecelia's Monsignor Thomas Colreavy began their first celebrations of mass in Indian Rocks Beach's American Legion Hall, home to several denominations, because it was available to anyone who wanted to rent the building.

In the beginning, the membership was about 25 families. Most of the attendees were retires, but membership kept growing. By 1954, mass was held in the City's Auditorium and occasionally in the nearby Fire Station.

Msgr. Colreavy realized their attendance would soon outgrow their space. In 1954, he purchased two acres of land on 5th Avenue (Walsingham Road), at the foot of the Walsingham Bridge, where the old GTE building sits today - an area known as Haven Beach Canal. The purchase included a cottage, large garage, and a boathouse. - Continued on page 7



CHANGES IN THE WAY STORMS ARE NAMED

The World Meteorological Organization has decided to no longer use the Greek alphabet as a way of identifying tropical storms when the normal list of 21 storms is exhausted. The alphabet has only been used twice – last year when nine letter names were used and in 2005, another busy year.



The alphabet names proved to be confusing to the public and made it difficult for people to track the storms. Many confused the sound of the letters. More attention was focused on the alphabet itself than on the possible danger of the storm.

"Zeta, Eta, Theta" said Kenneth Graham, the director of the National Hurricane Center, pointing to three Greek letters used to name three of the last storms of the season. "People were mixing the storms up."

The World Meteorological Organization's Hurricane Committee has developed a backup list of 21 names that will be used in place of the Greek letters if needed.

ST. JEROME CATHOLIC CHURCH, CONTINUED

On January 4, 1956, the Archbishop Hurley, announced the Indian Rocks Beach Parish would be designated the St. Jerome parish. The parish was named after Saint Jerome, Doctor of the Church and Theologian Writer and Historian. Born in Strido, Dalmatia (Croatia) in 347, his greatest achievement was the translation of the Bible, still used by the Catholic Church, and setting the standard for the King James Version 1,200 years later.

Archbishop Hurley appointed Father William Carroll, from St Pete Beach, the new parish's pastor. By now, over 100 families were attending mass.

Father Carroll lived in the Haven Beach Canal cottage and held mass in the garage. Furnished with folding chairs, the new chapel could seat 60 for daily Mass and was the first official gathering place for the Catholic family in Indian Rocks Beach. Within two years, attendance had grown to 740. In 1957, anticipating future growth, the Diocese purchased 20 acres of land on Hamlin Blvd.

Shortly thereafter, Father Carroll, in failing in health, requested he be replaced. Father Roman Gromala became the second Priest for St Jerome Church. He

saw the need for a larger worship space and began to raise money for a new building. The plans called for a building that could seat 600 people, plus a kitchen and social hall that held 250 people. The hall could also be used for classes. The estimated cost of the facilities was \$150,000.

Groundbreaking took place on Pentecost Sunday. The first mass was celebrated in the church at midnight Christmas Eve in 1960. The darkness was illuminated by car headlights and flickering bulbs attached to temporary generators. The church was dedicated by Archbishop Hurley on January 15, 1961.

They had one building housing the church, social hall classrooms and offices. Additions were added after 1974 including a new rectory building. Population growth was exploding along the beaches and in west Pinellas, and many were members of the Catholic faith. In less than ten years, church membership had grown from a handful to a church full.

Another expansion was needed and they broke ground on April of 1980 for the "Holy Family Chapel"- their pyramid shaped worship hall. It opened on July 15, 1982.

Farther Gromala continued to serve for 23 years. Monsignor Brendan Muldoon replaced him in May of 1983.

Under Monsignor Muldoon's guidance and leadership, the church added the Education Building in 1989 and the Early Childhood Center in the early 1990s. New offices were built in 2004. Prior to that, staff operated out of a double-wide trailer.

Father Muldoon brought many programs to the church. Most notable were the Lifeline program, collecting food and donations for their Feed the Homeless program, providing food to the homeless through Pinellas Hope and more.


His tenure also saw a new Senior Activity Center, a Teen Life Mass, and the Ed Kilroy Outreach Building which opened in 2008 and renovated of the main church building and a new alter. This was dedicated by Mass on December 17, 2011.

At the dedication Mass, Father Muldoon said, "For over fifty years, the people of Indian Rocks Beach and the surrounding area have given of their time, talent and treasure to build up the Body of Christ in this part of the Lord's vineyard. Ultimately, we thank God and His Blessed Mother for having us."

After thirty-three years of service, Father Muldoon retired in 2015. He was replaced by Father Thomas Morgan.

Today, St. Jerome is home to almost 2500 families and 7,000 parishioners. They conduct hundreds of marriages, funerals, Baptisms, First Communions, Confirmations and Anointings every year. While things are different during the pandemic, they still offer in person and online Mass. They are restricting attendance to only 25% maximum capacity inside the church.






NO BLACK AND WHITE IN A GRAY DIVORCE

Gray divorce is an increasing phenomenon among those over the age of 50. According to the National Center for Health Statistics, the rate of divorce over the age of 50 is 10 out of 1000, double the rate in 1990 and over 65 it has tripled. Any divorce is complicated but divorcing a long-term partner is fraught with issues, both financial and emotional.

The estate plan will need to change. New legal documents need updating. Do not forget the beneficiary on the life insurance, retirement plans, annuities, etc.

LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE

We have spent the time and money and now we want our landscape to look perfect. There are certain guidelines to protect your investment. The overall landscape includes plants, trees, sod, lighting, irrigation and water features.

Landscape includes trees, palms, shrubs and flowers. They need to be pruned and fertilized at least once a year - preferably in the spring. A license is now required to fertilize plants and sod in Pinellas County. Annuals and perennials can be planted once or twice a year and they require maintenance as well. Hedges always require attention especially in the summer months.

Lawns in Florida require much maintenance - the perfect amount of TLC. The right amount of mowing, fertilizing, watering and pest control is essential. Make sure your lawn maintenance company has references and proper experience to handle your property. A pest control company usually will treat the lawn using fertilizer, fungicide and insecticide as needed. A license is required to use any chemicals on lawns, plants and trees.

Landscape lighting maintenance includes changing bulbs, fixing broken wires, cleaning lenses and repositioning lights as needed. A two to four time a year checkup is standard depending on the amount of lights used and the size of the property. This is a gray area for licensing, however, any high-voltage lighting must be licensed. If more than plugging a cord into an outlet is involved than so is the license.

Irrigation systems need to be checked periodically- checking once a month is normal. Heads need to be cleaned and adjusted, the timer checked for accuracy and any leaking or broken pipes fixed. Grass should be removed around all

sprinkler heads monthly. Irrigation work also requires a license in Pinellas County.

Water features are popular now and need to be maintained as well. Water features include pools, fountains and ponds. Some require weekly maintenance or checking water levels in the dryer months. Water may or may not need to be chemically treated as well. Hire someone with plenty of experience here.

How Do They Do That? DUFFY'S GOLF STUDIO


Last month, Duffy's Golf Studio celebrated its tenth year. John Duff opened the small golf shop in the Belleair Shopping Center in 2011. As part of Duff's celebration, he sold the business to Nick Becerra and retired.

Becerra was looking for a golf related business opportunity and saw Duff's online Tampa Bay sales listing. He was immediately interested.

Growing up in New York, just north of Manhattan, Becerra played golf in high school. He was good and had a scratch handicap and a best ever score of 67. His handicap was .5—basically zero.

He attended the University of South Carolina where golf is a really big thing. "I bumped into Steve Spurrier on the campus golf course on many an afternoon after football practice," says Becerra about those days. "But I did not play on the school's team; I was never good enough to make the team there."

"I do really love golf," Becerra explains. "I knew I wanted to somehow be in the golf business." After college he started looking for opportunities.

With the help of a business broker, he found Duffy's and bought the business January 1st.

But what is a Golf Studio? And what does Becerra do?

"People who haven't been here before walk in the shop and ask, 'what do you do here'? Most of them are golfers, of course," Becerra chuckles.

"Primarily, we analyze golfers and their equipment and help them form a better match," he explains.

"Many people think we sell golf equipment, like tees and balls. We do not. We do however sell clubs. But primarily, we fix, and custom adjust a player's equipment. We do not teach or offer golf lessons. Instead, we study our client's mechanics and adjust their equipment to match their swing," Becerra says.

"Every player should have their loft and lies checked," Becerra emphasizes.

The lie is the angle that the club shaft goes into the club head. Each club has a standard lie angle. Standard clubs can either be flattened or made more upright. Flattening the club will decrease the lie angle whereas increasing the angle will make a club more upright.

"It is important to have the proper lie because it effects the way you contact the ball. If your lie is off, your ability to find the sweet spot on the club will also be off," Becerra explains.

"Most golfers have clubs that are too upright," adds Becerra. "This makes playing golf harder. If the club is too upright, you will make contact with the ground toe first," he adds. "Toe first contact will open the face of the club and the golfer may miss the shot. If the club is too flat, the golfer will make contact heel first. Heel first contact will close the clubface and the golfer will miss to the left."

"When the club has the right lie, you will contact the ground with the center of the club sole, creating straighter and more powerful shots," he concludes.

Clubs can be ordered at a specific angle or standard clubs can be retrofitted to fill player's needs.

"Loft/Lie fittings are the most cost effective way to improve your game," Becerra adds. "I recommend you have a club analysis before you decide the solution to improving your game is buying a new driver."




Most of Becerra's customers (about 75 percent) book an appointment, but about 25 percent just walk in. Many are repeat customers.






PATCHINGTON 35 YEARS

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LONG-TIME BELLEAIR MAYOR GARY H. KATICA PASSES AWAY

On the evening of Sunday, March 7, Belleair Mayor Gary H. Katica (87) passed away in his home, surrounded by loved ones. Mayor Katica served the Town of Belleair Commission for over 20 years, making him the longest-serving Mayor in Belleair history.

Mayor Katica was born in Newark, New Jersey and raised in Queens, New York. From 1952 to 1956, he served in the United States Air Force as a Control Tower Operator in the Korean War, and in 1957, he graduated from the Federal Air Traffic Academy in Oklahoma City and became an Air Traffic Controller in the New York Center. From 1957 to 1962, Mayor Katica attended C.W. Post College on Long Island University on a basketball scholarship. In the late 1960s and early 1970s, Mayor Katica served as a member of the Planning and Zoning Board and the Parks Commission for Port Jefferson New York and was later also elected as a trustee and appointed Police Commissioner.

In 1979, Mayor Katica, his wife Mary, and their two children Harry and Irene moved to Clearwater, and in 1984, to Belleair. Mayor Katica was first appointed to the Town of Belleair Commission in 2000 and elected Mayor in 2007 - a position he retained until his passing.

Over his tenure, Mayor Katica led the Town of Belleair through pivotal moments, such as the renovation of the historic Belleview Biltmore Hotel to the Belleview Inn, the retention of the Belleair Police Department, and the construction of the Dimmitt Community Center. He served the Belleair Civic Association and the Town's Finance Board and Planning & Zoning Board. Mayor Katica was also well-known for his daily support of the Belleair community through his regular walks in Belleair, his continual advocacy for infrastructure

improvements, his efforts to build partnerships and relationships with neighboring cities, his support of sports leagues and special events, his commitment to supporting Town staff, and his long-standing role as Santa Claus each Christmas.

Mayor Katica's leadership inspired countless others to serve Belleair with diligence and compassion, which was memorialized on Mayor Katica's birthday this year. On January 28, dubbed "Mayor Gary H. Katica Day" by the



Commission, the Belleair community came together for a special, socially distanced celebration. Staff, officials, and residents were provided commemorative t- shirts and asked to share their special memories and words of gratitude for the Mayor in what culminated to a YouTube video and a scrapbook for the Mayor (view the YouTuve video at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=zU5ddR677Js).

Mayor Katica will be remembered by us all for his years of service but also for the kindness, compassion, and love he shared with the world. He is survived by his wife, Mary, son Harry, preceded by his daughter, Irene, and survived by grandsons: Tyler, Michael, Nathan, Aaron, and Gary Jr.



VISIT NEARBY SILVER SPRINGS - A FLORIDA CLASSIC

Story & Photos by Bob Griffin, Publisher Have you ever been to Silver Springs? It is right next door to Ocala, Florida.

In March, my wife and I took our recently purchased camper-trailer to a Ocala campground to visited the Springs for the day. Before that, the last time I was there was over 50 years ago when I attended a statewide Boy Scouts Jamboree there.

It is about 125 miles - slightly over 2 hours - from our house in Indian Rocks Beach. It may take a little longer if you are pulling a camper.

The history of Silver Springs goes back centuries. Evidence has been found that the first Neolithic people (Florida's cavemen) lived there. Later, Timucua Indians frequented the springs. The Spanish left relics during their reign (1560 to 1821). Before Florida became a territory, the Seminole Indians lived in the area during the early1800s.



After Florida became a territory in 1822, the headwaters of nearby Ocklawaha River became important for shipping products and people in and out of Florida. This further developed in the 1850s. Pole barges and special steam steamships made their way from Jacksonville to the big spring and further after the introduction of railroads into the center of the State.

In the 1860s, Samuel Howse bought 242 acres surround the springs. After the Civil War, Silver Springs, as it became known, along with Ocala, began to attract tourists. The area received national attention through tourist journals and guidebooks and became a must-see stop on a Florida grand tour.

In 1870, Hullam Jones and Phillip Morrell fixed a piece of glass to the bottom of a small rowboat inventing their famous "glass-boat boat."

C. Carmichael bought 80 of the surrounding acres for less than \$3,000

in 1909 and retrofitted the tour boats with cushioned seats and canopies.

By 1924, Shorty Davidson and Carl Ray had acquired the rights to the park and improved the tourist attraction by adding gasoline-powered Glass Bottom Boats.

They later added zoological displays and demonstrations.

Now famous herpetologist Ross Allen joined their team and opened "The Ross Allen Reptile Institute" with a reptile show. In 1932 the glass bottom boats were converted to electric motors.

Tarzan movies were filmed at the springs. The first one, in 1935, was "Tarzan the Ape Man." It was followed by five more, all starring Johnny Weissmuller, filmed between 1935 and the early 1940s.

Silver Springs was the set of about twenty other movies and TV shows, including "Rebel Without A Cause," the James Bond movie "Moonraker," "Creature from the Black Lagoon," and episodes of the TV show "Sea Hunt" (1958-1961).

In 1916, "The Seven Swans" was the first movie filmed in Silver Springs. It included underwater photography and cinematography and the equipment for underwater filming was invented in Silver Springs for that movie.

The area around the spring has troupes of wild monkeys. People mistakenly believe the monkeys escaped from the Tarazan movies. However, they were brought to the area in 1930 as an upgrade to the tourist attraction and allowed to room free on an island for visitors to watch from boats. The owners of the park did not realize monkeys can swim. They quickly tired of the island and left. Today, their population is estimated to be 400.

In its heyday, Silver Springs was the largest tourist attraction in Florida, drawing over 800,000 people per year. At the time, the Florida was still segregated and the owners of the attraction created Paradise Park about a mile from the springs. The recreational facility was "for colored people only," as its sign said. It too had glass-bottom boats and herpetologist exhibits, and drew an additional 100,000 people a year.

Silver Springs began admitting Black patrons in 1967 and closed Paradise Park in 1969. Today it is covered in underbrush.

With the opening of Disney World in



1971 and additional tourist attractions in Florida, attendance started to wane.

The State of Florida bought the land around Silver Springs in 1985 and it is now Silver River State Park, fully protected from commercial development. The State later acquire the attraction, as well.

The condition of the water has been affected by fertilizer run off and septic outflow containing nitrates. This has led to an overgrowth of brown algae destroying the river's habitat. The schools of fish in the nearby Silver River has been noticeably reduced as well.

Today, the number of people visiting the park is a fraction of what it was. Regardless, Silver Springs still operates its Glass Bottom Boats seven days a week, with a nice garden area attached. The cost of admittance to the park is only \$2. Kids are free. The normal 30-minute boat ride is \$11.



A special 90-minute boat tour operates Friday, through Sunday for \$25; Reserved in advance, though as it sells out quickly.

The park is open seven days a week, even during Covid-19 restrictions and also offers canoe, paddleboard and Kayak rentals. The park does offer camping, but like all Florida State Parks, camping sites are hard to come by.

BONSUE BRANDVIK HONORED BY TOWN'S COMMISSION

BonSue Brandvik left St. Louis in the early '70s. With a background in Civil Engineering, she arrived in Belleair in 1993

Brandvik first involvement with the town's government was when she was a member of an ad hoc committee tasked with hiring a new police chief. "That is when I got to know Mayor Katica and some of the Town's staff and others on the council," says Brandvik. "Mayor Katica later asked me to fill an opening on the Planning and Zoning Board". That was in 2006.

"Gloria Burton was the longtime chairman of P&Z and we worked very well together," Brandvik recalls. "One day Gloria asked me to take over the Chairmanship. I was hesitant because I did not have that experience—and it was a lot more work. But I made a deal with her, and we alternated the chairmanship, year-to-year."

"We were always busy. We had two hurricanes in 2004 and then the real estate market crashed in 2008. When the Belleview Biltmore closed in June 2009, the owners of historic hotel tried to sell it. Most of the buyers wanted to tear it down and build condos."

"The hotel and surrounding area was zoned as a hotel, and historic at that. Half the community wanted to save the hotel; half endorsed a new start and added tax base of new condos."

"It was a very hot issue in Belleair", Brandvik adds "and I was in the Chairman's seat. It was a very rough ride. We had several owners and would-be owners bringing us proposals."

The Board of Planning and Zoning is an "advisory board" only. Its purpose is to provide "clarity and insight" to elected officials, employees and residents through their understanding and enforcement of the Town's laws and policies.

Long story short - The hotel closed June 1,2009. Developer JMC Communities bought the property in 2013, and began demolition in 2015. Part of the existing hotel was saved, relocated and reopened in December 2018. The majority of the condos being built on the surrounding the old hotel site are completed.

"To my credit, I was vocal and successful in getting Michael Cheezum, the developer, to save a part of the old hotel," explains Brandvik. The remaining structure has much of the look and feel of the old hotel built in 1896, but it only has 33 boutique rooms - the original had over 400 rooms.

After 14 years, Brandvik retired from the Planning and Zoning Board last year. She is a writer and today, she lives in a condo "in the shadow of the old hotel" - having written three books about the Belleview Biltmore. One is called "Spirits of the Belleview Biltmore" and is available on Amazon. She has also written two books for children.

The Town of Belleair presented BonSue Brandvik a plaque of appreciation at a recent Town Hall meeting thanking her for her 14 years of service (2006-2020).


"It was incredible what the NFL and BayCare are doing for us. We are so thankful and blessed," Rachel said.

PROUD TO BE ABLE TO CALL PINELLAS COUNTY A TREE CITY USA

"I think that I shall never see A poem as lovely as a tree."

I thought the opening stanza from Joyce Kilmer's beloved 1913 poem Trees would put us in the right mood for this month's topic: Pinellas County's bountiful urban forest.

Our Urban Forestry and Landscape Services section is responsible for maintaining and managing a diverse, healthy, and sustainable urban forest within the county. While the division's responsibilities are far-ranging, its most acclaimed accomplishment is the national recognition we have received for our urban trees.

With Earth Day April 22, and National Arbor Day April 30, this is the perfect time to boast that Pinellas County has earned the Arbor Day Foundation's designation of Tree City USA for the fourth year in a row – plus the coveted Growth Award – for our commitment to urban forest management. What's more, Pinellas County has been named a Tree City of the World for the second year in a row.

The Tree Cities of the World program, an international effort by the Arbor Day Foundation in coordination with the Agriculture Association of the United Nations, recognizes communities committed to ensuring their urban forests and trees are "properly maintained, sustainably managed and duly celebrated." We were one of only 23 communities in the USA in the inaugural Tree Cities of the World class last year, and we're one of only 123 this year.

More than 150 Florida communities received the Tree City USA designation, including 11 Pinellas municipalities: Belleair, Clearwater, Dunedin, Gulfport, Largo, Oldsmar, Pinellas Park, Safety Harbor, Seminole, St. Petersburg and Tarpon Springs. We were one of only four Florida counties so honored.

The Growth Award is presented by the Arbor Day Foundation to participating Tree City USA communities that demonstrate higher levels of tree care and community engagement. The city of Tarpon Springs also earned the award.

Tree City USA is a national recognition program that began in 1976 and is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service and National Association of State Foresters. To qualify for the designation, a community must meet four standards:

- Have a tree board or department responsible for trees on city/county-owned property.
- Have a tree care ordinance that forms the foundation of a tree care program.
- Have a community forestry program with an annual budget of at least \$2 per capita.
- Have an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

The much-coveted Tree City USA Growth Award celebrates continued improvement management efforts and skills beyond basic level of care. Our Urban Forestry team also received the Outstanding Urban Forestry Program Award from the Florida Urban Forestry Council. The award recognizes the design and implementation of our Urban Forestry services and education programs as exemplary among Florida State municipal programs.

As our forward-thinking Urban Forestry & Landscape Services section manager Michael DePappa recently pointed out, trees play a vital role in our everyday lives. When communities manage trees properly, our green infrastructure becomes more resilient, sustainable, and equitable. Trees planted today will offer social, environmental, and economic benefits for years to come.

WOMAN APPROVED MAKES THE DIFFERENCE

Another benefit of having a woman owner is the cleanliness of the moving trucks and blankets. In my 20s, my roommate and I used the cheapest mover we could find. The movers, smelling like stale cigarettes, arrived with a disgusting, filthy truck that had probably never been swept. Did you know your furniture can get cockroaches from a moving truck? Believe me, it's true! At that time, I never thought I would own a moving company with my husband, but it was a great learning lesson. Cleanliness is our standard: for our trucks, our moving blankets, and our movers!

In fact, for the first three years we reinvested all of our profits back into the business and have four brand new trucks. Personally, we have never purchased a new car off the lot, but for our business, reliability is just as important as cleanliness. Many movers have trucks older than I am (ok, slight exaggeration), but take it from someone whose first truck was old-they break down-frequently. We have never canceled a move due to truck maintenance issues and don't plan to start.

A client's worst nightmare is being "no showed" on moving day. To give peace of mind, we email agreements to review and sign upon booking. This is unique to our business.

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
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

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






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COMMUNITY DENTAL CLINIC RELIEVES PAIN - RESTORES HOPE

Throughout this pandemic year, Dental Community Clinic provided 7,264 procedures, and more than \$1,125,000 in free dental care for those who need it most. They are truly a community clinic. provided by our community for our community. With the



help of generous individuals, community partners, thoughtful foundations, local businesses and ever-determined volunteers, the Community Dental Clinic provides urgent dental care - free of charge - for the unemployed, underemployed, disabled, veterans and seniors in our area.

One patient, Herbert, a US Navy Veteran, is in the process of rebuilding his dental health after years of decline so that he can eat, sleep and work without pain. "I feel like a Six Million Dollar Man" he joked.

Another patient, Andrea, is temporarily homeless and lives with her family in a motel. To make ends meet, she works two jobs as a medical technician and a CNA caring for elderly patients. Her dental problems made it hard to do her job well until she came to the clinic. "I'm so glad they [CDC] were there for me. Their help makes me more confident and to speak better, pronounce my words better, and communicate. I am so thankful."

Through this unprecedented year, employment decreased, but teeth grinding, chipping and breaking increased by more than 50% - resulting in many more people in dental distress and unable to afford treatment. The clinic has enrolled 30 to 50 new patients every month and strives to provide a dental home to over 2,500 unemployed, underemployed, disabled, adults, veterans and seniors who live in Pinellas County.

The clinic is grateful for the help from the community in supporting their efforts, and sharing their information with those who find themselves in dental distress with no resources or insurance to seek care. There are loads of ways you can join in this mission.

SAND KEY INSPIRES SERIES OF KIDS' STORIES




When Swarna Mohan and her husband were looking for a retirement home in Florida, they took one look at Sand Key and decided that this was where they wanted to be. They wrapped up their affairs in Kentucky and moved to Florida in early 2018.

Swarna's retirement plans included walking on the

beach, playing duplicate bridge, volunteering, and traveling. She managed to do all those things in 2018 and 2019. She took several trips, and everywhere she went, she made short videos for her pre-K grandson Rohan, who lives abroad and loves homemade videos. But then came 2020 and the pandemic, and all travel stopped. What didn't stop were Swarna's morning walks, which she combines with beach cleanup. She is amazed at the number of toys that are left behind at the beach. She washes the toys and donates them.

One day, she helped a fellow walker get some fish that were stranded in a tide pool back to the sea. "What a great story that would make for Rohan," she thought. Among the toy's she had found were a toy dog with a cape, a pink ball, and a green rubber fish with stripes. These became the inspirations for Super Cape, Pinky Pink, and Stripey Fish. Swarna created additional props and made a video for Rohan, narrating how Super Cape and Pinky Pink rescue Stripey Fish. He loved the video, as did Swarna's grandnephews and grandniece. They wanted more stories, and Swarna turned to the beach at Sand Key for inspiration, where - from sponges, to wet rocks, to sand holes - there was no dearth of material. She created more storytelling videos. Then her friend Neena Sodhi, a retired allergist, suggested that she turn the stories into picture books, and offered to illustrate them. And thus were born The Adventures of Super Cape and Friends.

Each adventure is a rescue story on the beach. One 4-year old test reader wanted to know if Super Cape has super powers, and was thrilled to learn that what Super Cape has are super ideas. A second grade teacher gave her class the topic "How you can be a Super Hero" as a writing assignment, and used a Super




Cape book as an example. The books focus on the power of creative thinking, learning from failure, and cooperating to achieve success.


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GREAT TIME TO SPOT YOUNG OSPREY

Soon, you may see many young ospreys flying around. Osprey's have two primary hatching months - December and March. Within 30 days of hatching, the chicks will be 70-75% of their adult weight. They will begin to fly about 55 days after hatching but will use the nest as a home base until they migrate in September. Young ospreys will stay dependent on their parents until they are able to fish for themselves.

Osprey pairs are generally monogamous and often mate for life. There are an estimated 400 mating pairs in Pinellas County. Each year they usually return to their previous nest structures. If you watch a particular nesting site, you are likely seeing the same pair of birds each year.

The male selects the nesting site in a dead tree, or on a man-made structure over or near the water. Both birds collects the sticks and other nesting materials, but the female generally arranges the large and bulky nest.

The December chicks should be ready to strike out on their own a bit, and you will see them practicing their wing skills. There will be another group hitting the skies in May

DESK OF SHERIFF BOB GUALTIERIRemembering Deputy Michael J. Magli

Though the sun was shining bright on February 23, 2021, it was the Pinellas County Sheriff's Office's darkest day. Deputy Michael J. Magli was a true hero who saved countless lives and is an example of what it means to serve and protect with integrity and honor. Our PCSO family is heartbroken, but our lives will be forever changed and inspired by the legacy Deputy Magli left behind.

The support our community has shown the Magli family and our PCSO family has been overwhelming. Thank you for all the prayers, notes, and heartfelt acts of service these last few weeks. No motion of compassion and sympathy has gone unnoticed.

We also give special thanks to our law enforcement partners and others for their contributions to the service.

This is the first line-of-duty death in the sheriff's office's 109-year history. We never wanted this day to come, but we will continue to remember and honor Deputy Magli's life. His name will be inscribed on our memorial in front of the Sheriff's Administration Building, but more importantly, his name will be inscribed in our hearts forever.

The loss of Deputy Magli is a reminder of why our deputies wake up every morning. Their mission is to protect and serve the citizens of Pinellas County, and they put themselves in harm's way to save lives. Their oath is not limited to working hours; they are committed to protecting the public 24-7 and have a duty to act when evil enters their path.

Deputy Magli's example reminds us that a deputy's responsibility often goes beyond what is required of the uniform and involves matters of the heart. He cared about people and went out of his way to show it, whether it was telling a fellow deputy a joke when they felt down, taking extra time on a domestic call to ensure the couple was okay, or simply giving a citizen a bright smile as he crossed their path. The Pinellas County Sheriff's Office is leading the way in public safety, but just as important, we are making sure we show people we care.
