THE RISE AND FALL OF HAMLIN'S LANDING

efore it became the Holiday Inn Harbourside Hotel, that building was a mixed-use shopping village known as Hamlin's Landing. The project failed shortly after opening in the mid-1980s. It was named for the actual landing used by the ferry that crossed the Intracoastal Waterway at the Narrows before a bridge was ever built.

L.W. Hamlin and John H. Hendricks were two of the first Indian Rocks Beach landowners. They arrived in the area on a schooner that traveled through Clearwater Pass and anchored in the Anona area. The two men were on a pleasure trip and decided to explore the barrier island across from the mainland, known at the time as "St. Clement's



Point." It was really nothing but a sandbar covered in palmettos and mangroves. It was (and still is) part of an island known as "Sand Key."




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HAPPY BIRTHDAY!

2022 marks the 75th anniversary of the Marine Corps Reserve Toys for Tots Program. Founded in 1947 by reserve Major Bill Hendricks and his wife Diane, the mission of the program is "to collect new, unwrapped toys and distribute those toys to less fortunate children at Christmas." To

date, the program has distributed approximately 681 presents to over 280 million children.

NEW PARKING SYSTEM Pinellas County's park and boat ramp patrons can now use their mobile phones to pay for parking. New mobile parking technology has been installed transitioning to a pay-by-plate system.

Payments for parking at Sand Key Park, Fort De Soto, and Fred Howard Beach, all Pinellas County boat ramps, and the Belleair, Park Boulevard, and Sutherland Bayou boat ramps can be made using the Flowbird mobile parking app or a credit card at a pay-by-plate terminal. Guests will no longer need to display their receipts upon parking.

SANTA STILL NEEDS YOUR HELP The "Christmas Billboards" have been part of the holiday tradition in Indian Rocks Beach for five years now. There are 50 billboards. This is an all-volunteer activity coordinated by Bob Griffin, former publisher of this News Magazine. Griffin has agreed to coordinate this unique happening one more time in 2022. We are looking for a person or organization to pick up the program and continue it.

Basically, it consists of setting a start date (which is normally the Monday after Thanksgiving); putting out a request for help (via email and Facebook); going out the day prior and establishing the locations by putting poles in the ground (usually a team of 3 people); coordinating the event the day of (this normally takes 2-3 hours); then monitoring the billboards (in case of high winds). After the holidays, usually during the the first week of January, the coordinator will again call for volunteers to take down all the billboards. This normally takes 8-10 people, in 3 trucks, working for approximately 2 hours.

The Christmas Billboards have been a popular addition to our city's holiday decoration and spirit. To keep this program going, we need someone to volunteer to take the lead in 2023. LIFE JACKET LOANER STAND OPENS IN CLEARWATER

The Sea Tow Foundation, in partnership with MarineMax, opened the 1000th Life Jacket Loaner Stand at the Seminole Boat Ramp in Clearwater. The Life Jacket Loaner Program was started by the Foundation in 2008 providing boaters the

ability to borrow and return life jackets for a safe day on the water. The program has grown to include one thousand locations throughout all fifty states. Florida leads the nation in the number of boating accidents every year. 83 percent of drowning deaths could have been prevented if the person had been wearing a life jacket. The program has provided over 90,000 life jackets to boaters so far.




NEW FOUNDATION TO HELP FIRST RESPONDERS

In September, Pinellas County leaders officially launched the Mental Health for Heroes Foundation (HEROES) to help first responders and their immediate family members recover from grief and trauma by paying for counseling and other mental health services. Approximately 30 percent of first responders develop behavioral health conditions including, but not limited to depression, aggressive behavior and post-traumatic stress disorder. Nationwide, 186 first responders took their own lives in 2020 and 171 died by suicide in 2021, including at least four Florida officers.

In all, HEROES is being established with more than \$500,000 in seed money from Bay Area companies and foundations, including the Pepin Family Foundation, the Tampa Bay Rays, Duke Energy, Pinellas County Sheriff's Office, Bayfront Health, Vetted Security Solutions, the Vinik Family Foundation, Richard O. Jacobson, and the Frank Chivas Family. The goal is to provide an average of two hundred fifty hours of mental health services per month.

HAMLIN'S LANDING, Continued

Hendricks was first to buy the land we now call Indian Rocks Beach. In 1887, he bought 106 acres of "St. Clement's Point" from the state. He subsequently sold half of his purchase to Hamlin.

At the time, there was no way to get from the mainland to their island property without a boat. In 1890, Hendricks' son Harvey had an idea that would solve that problem and eventually make some money, too. He created a ferry service across The Intracoastal Waterway at the "Narrows," as it was known. He acquired a 20-foot, flat bottom scow that could ferry people and their horse drawn carriages across to the beach. In the beginning, Harvey provided the crossings as a convenience to residents. Later, he charged five cents per person. Horses, wagons - and later cars - were negotiable. The trip was about one hundred yards and took about 15 minutes.



The ferry crossed just south of today's Walsingham Bridge. It landed on a piece of undeveloped property owned by Hamlin. The Hamlin's built a dock to receive the visitors-mostly day-trippers. Thus, the area became known as Hamlin's Landing.

Harvey operated his ferry service for 26 years, from 1890 to 1915. The opening of the first Indian Rocks Bridge in 1916 put him out of business.

In the 1980s, that land was still a vacant lot just south of the rebuilt Indian Rocks Beach bridge. And it was still owned by a Hamlin - Horace Hamlin, Jr., who everyone called Harry, son of the L.W. Hamlin.

Developer Tom Twitty, well known in Pinellas County's real estate circles, wanted to build a mixeduse project on that waterfront land. He and his partners conceived a three-story Key West styled project with retail on the first level, and time-shares, hotel rooms, condominiums and townhouses above it. They struck a deal with Harry, now living out of state, and bought the land.

In the beginning, the projects outlook was great. The complex was named "Hamlin's Landing" and opened in 1985 with over

twenty specialty shops, a food court, boardwalk, marina, and a first-class hotel. It was even home to a paddlewheel dinner boat - the Starlite Princess – which docked behind the structure.

But quickly, the new Hamlin's Landing floundered, in large part due to the economy, but also because its business

model was flawed. In the mid-1980s, Indian Rocks Beach was not a major tourist destination. The shops in Hamlin's Landing catered primarily to tourists and without a year-round tourist base, they were unable to remain open.

"In 1986 they changed the tax laws affecting these types of investments," says Mike Twitty, Tom's son. "Investors lost their incentive to invest. Then the Savings & Loan crisis hit. The tourists did not

come, the shops closed, and the Starlite Princess moved on. It was the perfect storm." Mike was sixteen at the time and attended nearby Seminole High School. Today he is the Pinellas County Property Appraiser.

Tom Twitty and several partners were arrested on conspiracy, money





laundering, and bank fraud charges in their method of securing the loans needed to build Hamlin's Landing. The complex declared bankruptcy and closed but not before causing \$30 million in losses to Freedom Savings and Loan Association, which contributed to the saving and loan's collapse. Twitty spent two years in jail. Many feared the closed building would become a big, white elephant on a prime waterfront spot along the Intracoastal.

As the St. Pete Times (now the Tampa Bay Times) reported, "From the day it opened in 1986, Hamlin's Landing has generated more financial trouble than business. It has been through foreclosure, lawsuits, bankruptcy, receiverships and fights with local government."

A year later, in April of 1992, hotel owner Jeff Keierleber, who specializes in buying distressed properties, bought Hamlin's Landing. He removed the retail shops and opened the Jimmy Guana's restaurant. He converted the townhouses into hotel rooms and suites and became a franchise of the Holiday Inn company. It reopened in 1997, as the "Holiday Inn Harbourside" and the name "Hamlin's Landing" was again retired.

Today, the Holiday Inn Harborside is Indian Rocks Beach's largest hotel and its largest employer with over 120 employees. They are also the largest single taxpayer in the city. The property has 164 rooms. The marina offers fifty boat slips, most of which are rented monthly. Jimmy Guana's, a major restaurant, has continued to be very successful. The property has three area bars, several meeting rooms, two swimming pools and a waterpark.

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

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


ELIMINATING RISK OR ADDING IT?

One of the basic tenets of investing is to eliminate as much risk as possible, but instead, investors are often adding risk unknowingly.

If you have cash to invest, should you invest it all at once, or over time? If you have a long-range view (10+ years) you usually come out ahead by investing all at once. But do that in these volatile times and you may not sleep well. Use dollar cost averaging over a 6–12-month period of time.



Next is sequence of return risk. Those that thought they could retire at the beginning of this year may feel less comfortable because \$1 million on January 1st may be down as much as 20%. Conversely, if they retired at the beginning of 2020 they would be delighted because both markets were up.

Realize that movements up and down make a difference. If you are down 20%, it takes a 25% move up to get to even. If you are up 20%, it takes a downturn of 15% before you lose all of your "profits".

Therefore, consider rebalancing your portfolio on a regular basis but no more than every six months or a year. You want to maintain the proper asset allocation. By not rebalancing you add risk. Sell what went up and buy what went down. Sell high, buy low. Yes, you will have to pay a little in taxes, but it is generally worth it.

There can be a difference between asset allocation and diversification. They are not always the same. Many people think that buying multiple stocks makes for diversification, but if they are all technology growth stocks you have the opposite; it is called concentration. We often see this when investors owned the stock of the company for which they work representing too much of the portfolio on a percentage basis.

Too much diversification leads to "diworse-ification". If you own too many things then nothing can hurt very much, but nothing will help very much either. On the equity side, don't buy more than 30-40 individual stocks or more than one mutual fund in each asset class.

THE 44TH ANNUAL TURKEY TROT - NOVEMBER 24

The 44th Annual Turkey Trot, as always, will be held Thanksgiving morning—This year, that is November 24.

The Trot unofficially began in 1977, started by the West Florida Y Runners Club of Pinellas County at Howard Park in Tarpon Springs. In 1979, it moved to Thanksgiving morning and relocated to the Clearwater High School stadium. 995 runners participated that year. In 1995, they had a record 10,217 participants; it is consistently to over 17,000 to date.

The West Florida Y Runners Club is still the owner of the Turkey Trot. They have had an all-volunteer steering committee for the last 30 years and it is considered one of the top three runs in Florida – definitely the largest in Pinellas County. "At one point, we were one of the top twenty 5K races in the nation," says founding organizer Skip Rogers. "It began with a 10K run for the club, and in 1980, we added the 1 Mile Gobbler, which allowed walkers and families to participate".

"In 1988, we added the 5K Wing Ding, which is still the most popular," Rogers adds. "Then, we added the 4K Drumstick."

"The City of Clearwater is our major sponsors. We could not do the race without their assistance in many areas," Rogers says. "We have volunteers that help us from Morton Plant/BayCare, another major sponsor. They have helped us tremendously through the years with T-shirt distribution and race day registration. We have people that have faithfully come every year to help us."

The Turkey Trot is about families of runners, and walkers of all skill levels. Generations of families run together every year even great-grandparents with their great-grandchildren in strollers. They are there to have fun and to finish their race. Some considered the Turkey Trot as a friends reunion.

Groups that have busy lives still get together for the Trot. Some even fly in just for the run. Well, the fact that it is Thanksgiving Day probably helps too.

There will be plenty of music at the Turkey Trot, provided by nine local bands along the course - country, bluegrass, bagpipes, jazz, rock n' roll, it is all there. "We have been told the music is one of our best features," Rogers says.

The Turkey Trot is also about giving. For many years, the West Florida Y Runners Club has given college scholarships to area seniors. They also give \$100,000 each year to non-profit organizations to help families and children.

"We contribute to organizations that help single mothers with children be removed from abusive situations, charities that help homeless persons, veterans, families in desperate need, and a children's home," Rogers says. "We also collect canned and dry goods from our participants and donate it to a community food bank. We do not publicize these charity groups on purpose."

If you want to run, the 44th Annual Turkey Trot at Clearwater High School here are the facts: It is November 24 and this year there are only two races: A 1-Mile Gobbler and a 5K Wing-Ding. The 1 Mile Gobbler starts at 8:30am and costs \$25 in advance or \$30 after November 19. The 5K Wing-Ding starts at 7am and is \$30 in advance or \$35 after November 19. Register in advance online TurleyTrot.net. Same day registration is at the stadium at Clearwater High School on Gulf to Bay.

Advance registration includes their popular shirt. They recommend you show up one hour before your race. Call 442-5838 for more information.





MEET TREASURE ISLAND FIRE DEPARTMENT'S LATEST RECRUIT

Since the eighteenth century, fire stations in the U.S. have kept "station dogs," whose job traditionally was to calm the horses that drew the equipment carriage to fire scenes. In modern times, station dogs no longer tend to horses, but serve an equally important position keeping up the morale of firefighters during long and emotionally exhausting shifts. The Treasure Island Fire Department welcomed its latest recruit in September. "Captain," an 8-month-old beagle puppy was adopted by the TIFR crew after they learned about the rescue of almost 4,000 beagles from a puppy mill in Cumberland, Virginia.

The Virginia facility had been in operation for over 50 years, breeding dogs to sell to laboratories for research. The animals were kept in cages without beds, toys, or stimulation. After an extensive undercover investigation conducted by PETA and a local news station, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) cited Envigo, the facility's operator, for more than 70 violations of the federal Animal Welfare Act and the operation was shut down.

Puppy mills are large-scale breeding operations designed to mass-produce offspring and maximize profit for the breeder. There are about 2,000 of these federally licensed facilities



in the U.S., some of which responsibly place importance on the animals' health. Unfortunately, ensuring proper care is expensive, and many breeding facilities comply to the minimum legal standard at best. The USDA regulates animal breeding under the federal Animal Welfare Act of 1966. This is the only federal law regulating the treatment of animals in research, teaching, testing, exhibition, transport, and breeding. It provides minimal survival standards for dogs and cats in breeding facilities. State laws can be more strict and vary widely across the country, resulting in a concentration of bad breeders in states with lax laws and poor enforcement.

According to the Animal Legal Defense Fund, Florida ranked number 7 in the nation for best animal protection laws in a matrix combining various elements such as animal assault laws, veterinarian reporting requirements, post-conviction possession bans, and shelter requirements. More than 80 local governments in the state have passed ordinances banning retail sale of dogs and cats in pet stores, resulting in an increase in adoptions. Nationwide, Florida ranks third in pet adoptions according to Dutch, a veterinary telehealth service.

The closure of the Virginia breeding facility prompted a nationwide coalition of animal welfare organizations to facilitate the adoption of the rescued dogs. The Humane Society of Tampa Bay received fifteen of the beagles on August 25th and all were adopted in a few days, including Captain. He is now the official station dog at Fire Station 24 in Treasure Island. According to a TIFR press release, "Captain will serve as a therapy dog for our first responders. He will also join the department at public education events and become TIFR's official mascot."



IRB LOSES FORMER CITY COMMISSIONER JIM PALAMARA

Indian Rocks Beach lost colorful and outspoken former City Commissioner Jim Palamara this summer.


Jim was elected six times, for a total of twelve years on the IRB City Commission and served on IRB's Planning and Zoning Board and Board of Adjustment and Appeals. He was also past president of the IRB Homeowners Association.

Jim was an unconventional commissioner, listing his phone, fax and email on campaign literature so that any resident could contact him 24/7. He opposed limiting commission meeting time to two hours, saying he was "not a pumpkin" and would stay past midnight if that's what it took to hear all resident input.

Jim was a huge proponent of reducing IRB's millage rate whenever property values increased so as not to raise taxes. In order to safeguard IRB's small-town feel, Jim worked to establish a supermajority vote requirement for any increases in building height and density. Thanks to Jim's efforts, any increase requires the approval of four of five commissionersnot just three.

Jim was a big guy-big in stature and big at heart. A licensed general contractor by trade, Jim was known for his gruff voice and New York accent, which he managed to retain from growing up in Staten Island. It was there that he graduated high school, began his career in construction and married his wife, Karin. Coming from New York City, it's not surprising he was a dedicated Yankees fan. However, few would guess he was also a Dead Head who saw the Grateful Dead in concert in almost every city on multiple continents.

and moved to Indian Rocks Beach in 1983, and they traveled extensively in Europe when visiting his wife's family in Germany. The quality of his construction skills can not only be seen locally in some of Pinellas County's finest homes but also in jobs as far away as Africa and the Middle East.



Chris Carnes met Jim just after buying a house on Janice Place in 1989. They remained close friends until the end. Chris felt privileged to be with him and swap stories during his last hours. Chris remembered Jim as a good guy who would do anything for you. "He worked his butt off for our city government, always standing up for the rights off all residents." Chris said Jim would always bring him a souvenir rock from his travels abroad. The largest was a piece of the Berlin Wall, complete with barbed wire and graffiti. That has a place of honor on Chris' mantle.





IT'S ANOTHER GIRL, AGAIN

99% OF FLORIDA SEA TURTLES ARE FEMALES

Turtles are an ancient group represented in the fossil record as far back as 200 million years, but their continued existence is not guaranteed. Florida sea turtles are being impacted by the effects of climate change – and at least for now - they are losing the fight. They are experiencing a gender imbalance caused by the rising temperatures.

For unknown reasons, when a female turtle deposits her eggs on a beach, the sand's temperature determines the hatchlings' gender. Recent heat waves have caused the sand to be so hot, nearly 99 percent of the sea turtles across Florida are being born female — all because of climate change. Scientists are just not finding many male sea turtle hatchlings.

Bette Zirkelbach, who manages a turtle hospital in the Florida Keys, told Reuters an Australian study showed similar statistics - "99% of new sea turtle babies are female." This could spell disaster for populations of sea turtles, who are already facing other threats from poaching and habitat destruction. If this trend isn't reversed, scientists predict there will be no more males in twenty to thirty years – meaning no more production.

Instead of determining sex during fertilization, the sex of sea turtles and alligators depends on the temperature of developing eggs, according to the National Oceanographic Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). Eggs incubated below 81.86 degrees Fahrenheit result in male hatchlings. Incubation above 88.8 degrees Fahrenheit results in female hatchlings. Fluctuating temperatures result in either. Unfortunately, temperatures aren't fluctuating — they just head upwards.

"The frightening thing is the last four Florida summers have been the hottest summers on record. Scientists that are studying sea turtle hatchlings and eggs have found no boy sea turtles, so only female



sea turtles for the past four years," Zirkelbach explains.

"Over the years, you're going to see a sharp decline in their population because we just don't have the genetic diversity," Melissa Rosales Rodriguez, a Miami Zoo sea turtle keeper, told Reuters. "We don't have the male-to-female ratio needed in order to be able to have successful breeding sessions."

The problem is magnified since, today, for every 1,000 sea turtle eggs laid, only about one turtle reaches adulthood. Even if turtles survive the possible effects of global climate change on their sex ratios, sea levels rising and stronger storms are eroding their beach habitats. In addition, warming oceans are changing ocean currents and harming the coral reefs some turtles need to survive.

This is not unique to Florida, worldwide, the sea turtle gender balance is off kilter. Scientists are testing methods to cool nests. Gently digging up eggs and moving them to shadier parts of the beach has proved to work. So do sprinkler systems and dividing offspring into smaller batches as the eggs tend to warm each other.

Even worse, NOAA is warning that if sand temperatures get too high, it could kill developing turtles all together, meaning soon, there may be no hatchlings at all.



IRB NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS CELEBRATES 100TH ISSUE

Lora and I are finishing our first year publishing the Indian Rocks Beach Neighborhood News Magazine; we are proud to celebrate its 100th issue this month. The magazine was started almost twenty years ago by Lora's dad and stepmom, Bob and Becky Griffin. Bob had a background in marketing, working for Little Caesar's Pizza and later opening his own ad agency. Becky previously worked as a Medical Technologist at HCA Pasadena Hospital, and eventually became responsible for their information technology.

In 1995, they began producing a directory for tourists that was distributed by area hotels. They started in Indian Rocks Beach, expanded to cover all the Pinellas beaches, and eventually had publications in 30 cities throughout the state. The directories featured maps and area information, as well as advertising for local businesses.

Around the year 2000, the Indian Rocks Beach city manager began a newsletter for residents. It was a simple, monochrome publication containing city information and featuring local organization pages. After a disagreement with the city manager, Bob and Becky decided to start their own newsletter. "We didn't want our product to be full of politics or complaints about the city or county," Becky said. "We decided if we were going to do it, we had to focus on positive, fun content that you didn't see anywhere else."

The Indian Rocks Beach Neighborhood

Newsletter debuted in May of 2006 with a cover story about "Old Noisy," the city's first auto bridge. The twelve-page magazine featured city phone numbers, a calendar of upcoming events, local news information, and a center photo spread of the recent community event "Beauty and the Beach" festival. "Our philosophy from the beginning was that the people in Indian Rocks Beach wanted to know about things from the surrounding areas Indian Shores, Belleair Bluffs and Largo," said Bob. "People in Indian Rocks cross the bridge for their shopping, services and entertainment. We wanted to cover basically a three to five mile radius but still keep the focus extremely local." The newsletter came out every two months and was mailed directly to all city residents. "We did not plan



to make a profit, but we did sell ads to pay for the printing and postage.," said Bob. The newsletter did turn a profit, however. "Looking back, many businesses in those first newsletters are still in it today," Bob said.

Shortly after the IRB newsletter began, the City of Madeira Beach approached the Griffins about producing a similar product for their city. They later started Belleair, Clearwater Beach, and downtown St. Petersburg. As the small, family-run business grew, extra help was needed. Bob and Becky's kids were recruited for various tasks, such as labelling and stuffing envelopes for ad solicitation mailers, distributing magazines at businesses, and other administrative tasks. "During college my daughter Erin's job was to collate our inserted flyer ads and staple them inside the newsletters. Sometimes there

were fifteen inserts for each of several thousand magazines," Becky recalls. "After she graduated, she told us she wasn't doing the inserts anymore. At that point, Bob and I decided we weren't doing them anymore either!"

They also developed Best Restaurant Magazines for the beaches, downtown St. Petersburg, Tampa, and Key West. During this time, Bob and Becky were still producing the hotel directories. These were tourism-based, and that industry is fickle. "We were in cities from Ft. Walton Beach to Key West," said Becky. "So whenever there was a hurricane, it was going to hit one of our markets." After the recession in 2008, they phased out the directories and focused on the Neighborhood News and Restaurant Magazines. They recently published their 50th issue of the Best Beach Restaurants Magazine,

which covers Pass-a-Grille to the Dunedin Causeway.

A few years ago, Bob and Becky began thinking about retirement. Lora and I moved to Dunedin to learn more about the business, and took over production of the Indian Rocks Beach Neighborhood News Magazine in January of 2022. Bob and Becky bought a house in Boone, NC and have been splitting time between there and Indian Rocks Beach. They continue to produce the Belleair and Clearwater Beach newsletters as well as the Restaurant Magazine, until they retire. "Together we have reached our 100th issue – and our 17th year," said Bob. "We hope our kids keep it up for another 100."

These classes are not your standard webinar sessions where the students sit at their computers and are lectured to. And they're not animated cartoon sessions where you have to keep pressing enter to get to the next topic. The classes being offered by the Clearwater Coast Guard Auxiliary are conducted on Zoom with the same instructors the student would have had in the classroom and allows lots of questions and answers. In addition, because the classes are over the Internet, there's no commuting to a classroom – the students can be anywhere in Florida!

The boating safety class is also a requirement for many boaters in Florida. In the Sunshine State, anyone born after Jan. 1, 1988, must successfully complete a boater safety course approved by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) in order to operate any boat powered by more than 10 horsepower, and they are required to carry their boater education card with them when out on the water along with picture ID.


