
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### JACK ECKERD - THE MAN BEHIND THE DRUGSTÖRE CHAIN

or even '90s, you know the name Jack Eckerd. He created a drugstore chain, featuring his name, that at its height had over 2,600 stores in twenty states.

Eckerd was born in Delaware in 1913 and graduated from Culver Military Academy. His father, Milton Eckerd, started the Eckerd Drug Store chain in Erie, Pennsylvania. Then, the chain had thirteen stores. In 1940, at the



World War II changed his plans. As a First Lieutenant in the Army Air Force, he logged over 2,000 flying hours. By the end of the war, he was a Major and had received three Air Medals and a Presidential Unit Citation from Harry Truman.


He went to the Boeing School of Aeronautics to be a commercial pilot but there were too many other pilots after the war. So, at age 32, with no available airline pilot jobs, and a wife and child to support, he returned to the drug store business. After their second child was born, the couple divorced.

In 1952, Eckerd moved to Pinellas County and bought three existing Pay Less Drug Stores that he added to the Eckerd chain. Eckerd found another Tampa location he liked, and within three years, he added two more stores for a total of six.

On a blind date in 1957, Eckerd met socialite Ruth Binnicker Swann. He was a divorcee with two children in Delaware, she was a widow living with her three children in Tampa. They were married six weeks later. Together, they had two more children – for a total of seven.

"When I met Jack, he said he worked in the drug store business," remembered Ruth. "I thought he was a pharmacist or something."



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## Did You Know



#### **POSTAL FOOD DRIVE**

The second Saturday in May, letter carriers in more than 10,000 cities and towns collect nonperishable food from their postal customers, when they participate in the Stamp Out Hunger National Food Drive — the largest one-day food drive in the nation.

Food collected from Indian Rocks Beach is taken to the Beaches Food Pantry. Just

leave your donations by your mailbox Saturday May 13th and your local Mail Carrier will pick it up.

#### LOGGERHEAD TURTLE NESTING SEASON BEGINS

From May 1st through October 31st, Loggerhead Sea turtles successfully nest and hatch along the beaches of St. Petersburg and Clearwater. With over 20 miles of shoreline, our area is prime real estate for turtle nests. Female turtles come ashore in the dark, dig a hole and lay 100 to 150 eggs at a time. During the course of a season, a single female lays three to eight nests. After a 45 to 70 day gestation period, hatchlings emerge from the nest at night and follow the moonlight reflecting off the Gulf.

Sea turtles can be disoriented by lights visible from the beach causing hatchlings to become attracted inland. When this happens, they most often die of dehydration, predators, or are run over by motor vehicles. Occupants of beachfront

properties are asked to minimize the use of lights that shine directly on the beach. Information about turtle friendly beach lighting from the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission can be found in the Sea Turtle Lighting Guidelines on the

MyFWC.com website.

**SEAGRASS LOSS REVERSES PROGRESS** The paradigm that made Tampa Bay an international success story for nearly three decades is changing. More than 30 percent of the bay's seagrasses have been lost since 2016, with acreage in Old Tampa Bay at the lowest level ever recorded. Throughout the bay, seagrasses declined by 11,599 acres of seagrasses from the high of 41,655 posted in 2016. Water quality parameters are still meeting targets set in the early 1990s. The exact causes are unknown.


**RENTAL ORDINANCE PASSES FIRST VOTE** Indian Rocks Beach City Commissioners voted 3-1 to approve the short term rental ordinance at the April 11th Commission Meeting after lengthy debate and public comment. Under the new ordinance, certain rentals would have occupancy caps of twelve occupants for the next two years and ten occupants thereafter and would be required to have one parking space for every bedroom. Rental owners would have to register their property with the city, pass an inspection and be required to have a representative available to respond to complaints at all times.

The ordinance will have to pass a second vote before being enacted. Commissioners are also closely watching a state bill that, if passed, would impose greater limitations on the ability of local governments to regulate short term rentals.

**DETOUR CONTINUES** Indian Rocks Road, within the Town of Belleair, is still under construction. They predict the road closures and detours between Mehlenbacher and Poinsettia Road will continue until September. Information and the timeline is updated on their website, TownofBelleair.com.

### JACK ECKERD, Continued

In 1959, George Jenkins, owner of Publix, asked Eckerd to team up his drugstores with his grocery chain. Jenkins proposed that they build shopping centers together and everywhere Publix went, Eckerd would go, too. And that is what happened.

"Actually, dad wanted to sit on his dozen or so stores and live a quiet manageable life," says his daughter Nancy Eckerd Nichols. "But George Jenkins' proposal was too good to pass up. It kick-started his expansion plans."

Jenkins asked him to be a part of the next five Pinellas County Publix stores. Eckerd knew it took about \$150,000 to get a store off the ground - he would need \$750,000.

Ruth's previous father-in-law, James Swann, was President of the National Bank of Tampa. Swann suggested borrowing the money from his competitor — the Exchange Bank of Tampa. So, he did

Now 45, Eckerd had reached the big time. "It was double or nothing," Eckerd said. "I was going for it all." Ultimately, Eckerd and Jenkins built over 150 supermarket drugstore combinations.

In 1961, with still only twelve stores operational, The Jack Eckerd Corporation went public on the US Stock Exchange.

"My reason to go public was the common reason," Eckerd said. "I needed capital to sustain our rapid growth without constantly having to borrow from the banks."

"I remember Jack Eckerd well," says George Feaster, founder of Serenity Funeral home. "We were both active in local organizations. At one meeting, members were dealing out stock certificates to the new Jack Eckerd Corporation like they were playing cards. I asked them what it was, and they said it was Jack's stock \$10 a share. I told them I would take 100. Then, I had to come up with \$1,000," Feaster says with a grin. "After splitting several times, I sold it for over \$100,000."

"I gave up sole ownership of the company in order to grow," explained Eckerd. "I cut my employees in on the action, as well. Selling 200,000 shares at \$10 per share was easy."

After that, the Eckerd chain doubled every two years for the next sixteen years!

In the early years, Eckerd tried to visit every store around Christmas—and meet as many employees as possible.

"His idea of a Christmas vacation was to load all the kids in the car and go visit new stores," says daughter Nichols.

At first, Eckerd kept his name in the local phone book so customers could call him with a problem. "We called that phone the 'Nut Line'," remembers Nichols. "If we answered it, we had to follow-up and solve the problem so, we tended not answer our

home phone."

Eckerd was an innovator and a risk taker. He visited stores in California and brought some of their ideas home. He experimented with self-service, a new concept, which today is standard. He invented the Senior Discount. Eckerd stores became known for selling products at lower costs.

Even before the Civil Rights Act, Eckerd desegregated his lunch counters before phasing them out. He defied Florida's "Fair Trade" laws, which let suppliers and manufacturers set retail prices. He fought the law until it was changed.

He introduced film processing and photo printing in the stores and was the first to offer the "Second Print Free." Eckerd built a film processing company that became an industry leader.

Eckerd sold his personal shares of stock in his company in 1986 to the Merrill Lynch investment company. He resigned as the CEO and ownership passed to his employees and other investors. At that time there were approximately 1,500 stores. Ten years later, JC Penney bought the Eckerd Drug stores and operated 2,600 stores before selling them to CVS and the Jean Coutu Group which became Rite Aid. By 2007, Eckerd Drugs was gone.

At its peak, the Jack Eckerd Corp. was the nation's second largest drug store chain and Tampa Bay's largest locally owned business with sales of over \$5 billion a year.

In 1975, Fortune Magazine estimated Eckerd's fortune to be around \$150 million.

Eckerd was more than just a businessman, he was also a philanthropist and spent the last two decades of his life giving away much of his \$150 million.

One of Eckerd's biggest passions was helping children - he had seven after all. He visited a Texas wilderness camp for troubled children, which led him to create a Florida version. He formed Eckerd Kids with a boy's camp near Brooksville and a girls cam near Floral City. He eventually had wilderness camps with programs that helped over 50,000 troubled teenagers.

Eckerd was an avid, professional sailor. He owned the *Panacea*, 52-foot sailboat designed by Charlie Morgan. "We had that boat rigged for competition," says Courtney Ross of Ross Boat Services. "Jack bought property on Clearwater Pointe, near today's Clearwater Yacht Club, for no other reason than to have a place to moor it." He raced it from the St Petersburg Yacht Club to places like Sarasota, Key West, Cuba and the Bahamas.

"Jack was a really great guy," remembers Ross. "He was always a lot of fun."



Eckerd became a trustee at the Florida Presbyterian College that was struggling under a tremendous debt. There was talk of its closing or merging into the University of South Florida. Eckerd had given the school several million dollars over the years, but in 1972 he donated \$10 million to the college—with no strings attached. In return, they changed the name to Eckerd College. In all he gave the small college to over \$20 million.

For a short time, Eckerd College asked him to fill in as interim President. "That was kind of funny, being that Eckerd College was a very liberal school and Dad was the opposite - a staunch conservative," explains Nichols. "He always said it was an eye-opening experience."

Eckerd later told Fortune Magazine, "That donation to the college was the best investment I ever made."

From the beginning, Jack and Ruth were involved in building a Clearwater Performing Arts Center. When Richard Baumgardner, owner of the Kapok Tree Restaurant, donated thirty-eight acres, Eckerd and other volunteers made it happen. As a result, on October 15, 1983, the main auditorium, Ruth Eckerd Hall, named in Ruth's honor, opened.

Over his career, he wrote three books:

- Finding the Right Prescription, published by Fleming H. Revell Co., 1987
- Enough is Enough: Solving Florida's Prison Crisis published by Justice Fellowship, 1990
- Why America Doesn't Work co-authored with Charles Colson, published by W Pub Group, 1992

The Eckerds lived many years in Belleair at 120 Willadel. Erwin Schemringer, owner of E&E Stakeout remembers, "Jack and Ruth used to eat in my restaurant all the time. The first time she was in, I wanted to meet her and asked 'how do you like my new restaurant?' She said she liked it 'but it seems a bit expensive, don't you think?'"

As his kids moved out, he and Ruth bought a beachfront home on north Clearwater Beach in Carlouel. In 2004, at the age of 91, Eckerd died of pneumonia in Clearwater. Ruth died two years later at the age of 84.




### SAVING FOR RETIREMENT? PLANNING TO RETIRE? ENJOYING RETIREMENT?

#### The Rules Have Changed - Secure 2.0

In late December, Congress passed the \$1.65 trillion-dollar Omnibus Bill (4,155 pages) and within it SECURE 2.0 (350 pages) which made over ninety changes to retirement planning. Regardless of where you are in life, this bill affects how you save for and spend



in retirement. Here are only three critical changes.

Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs)

SECURE 1.0 increased the RMD to age 72 and SECURE 2.0 changes it to age 73 in 2023 and to age 75 in 2033. This allows the retiree to delay taking money if they don't need it and thus, the money has more time to accumulate on a tax deferred basis. This delay could actually increase your taxes and Medicare premiums. It may make sense to take money out before you are forced to do so and perhaps even convert it to a Roth IRA.

**Catch-Up Contributions** 

The catch-up amount in 2023 is \$7,500 and the regular amount is \$22,500 for a total of \$30,000. Beginning in 2025, those ages 60, 61, 62 and 63 may put in the greater of \$10,000 or 1.5 times the current catch-up contribution amount, whichever is greater. There is a "catch" to the "catch-up", however. If the participant makes over \$145,000, then the catch-up must go into a Roth 401k – non-deductible but tax-free growth. Unfortunately, the \$1,000 catch-up contribution for an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) has not changed since 2006. Beginning in 2024 it will be indexed for inflation.

Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)

For those that have reached age 70 1/2, they have had the option to put up to \$100,000 into a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). By giving directly from the IRA to a qualified charity, the IRA owner does not declare this distribution as income, nor do they get a deduction. In 2024, the QDC amount will be increased for inflation. By using the IRA for charitable purposes rather than taking it as cash, it will keep one's income lower. This will result in keeping the Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) lower and may not cause the taxpayer to pay a higher premium for Medicare.

#### INDIAN ROCKS BEACH SWIMMER PAT MARZULLI GOES THE DISTANCE

If you see an orange buoy bobbing behind a swimmer touring the coves and canals off the Intracoastal Waterway, there's a good chance you're spotting Indian Rocks Beach resident Pat Marzulli, 74.

Growing up in Largo, Marzulli was always around water. He learned to swim at the Tides Bath Club on North Redington Beach and swam with friends in the Gulf or at the former Pier Pavilion Pool at Clearwater Beach. At Largo High School (class of '66), he swam the breaststroke on a team that always got pummeled by Clearwater.

It wasn't until he was in his mid-30s that Marzulli started swimming again, after being invited to join a master's team at the Clearwater YMCA. About five years later, he was asked to be on a relay team in the annual Swim Around Key West, a 12.5 mile in the Florida Keys. After that first openwater competition, the bug hit him hard.

"In general, swimming gives me a big dose of dopamine that I don't get from other exercise," said Marzulli, who swims freestyle to compete. "I enjoy pool swims, but with the open water, there's a freedom to it. Every day is different."

He often swims with friends in pools, the Gulf or from his 12th Avenue dock. Despite what some people think, the Intracoastal is perfectly safe to swim in, and no dirtier than the Gulf," he says.

After participating in the Key West relay, Marzulli went on to compete in dozens of swims. Many have been in Florida, including most of the Tampa Bay Frogman Swims across Tampa Bay, as well as swims around Lido Key and Fort DeSoto.

Along the way, he's racked up records and medals – a slew of them hang on a bust in his home office. (Marzulli is a commercial real estate broker specializing in industrial properties.) His top events have included the 28-mile Manhattan Island Marathon Swim in 2015, where he logged the second-fastest time for all swimmers older than 65, and, in 2018, two major swims in Arizona, the tougher being 17 miles on Lake Apache, where he remains the oldest person to have competed, at age 69.



Those helped prepare him for his pinnacle event – the Catalina Channel in California. For that he logged 21 miles in 15:29:11 and holds the record as the oldest swimmer to complete it, two months shy of his 70th birthday. "That was my most difficult and meaningful race," he said. "It was a tug of war between wind from one direction and current from the other."

Camaraderie is an important part of the sport for Marzulli, who met his wife, Martine, through a fellow swimmer in 2002. During the COVID pandemic, when pools were closed, a group of swimmers faithfully gathered at Marzulli's house to launch off his dock. He supplied refreshments and an invitation to use the heated outdoor shower.

"There is one thing long-distance swimmers have in common with the rest of us, he said. "The hardest part of the swim is getting in the water."

Diane Daniel, founder of VacationDonations.org, was inspired to take her first dip in the Intracoastal after talking to Marzulli.

#### **RECLAIMED WATER RESTRICTIONS**

Pinellas County's seasonal reclaimed water restrictions begin on Saturday, April 1, and run through Friday, June 30. Due to supply fluctuations between the north and south county systems, the watering schedules for reclaimed water users are different for customers in each service area. To encourage responsible use of reclaimed water, the following watering schedules will be enforced.

North County Reclaimed Water Schedule

Starting April 1, north county reclaimed water customers may irrigate only two days per week based on property address, according to this schedule:

- Addresses ending in an even number may water on Tuesday and/or Saturday.
- Addresses ending in an odd number may water on Wednesday and/or Sunday.
- Parcels with mixed or no address, such as common areas associated with a residential subdivision, may water on Wednesday and/or Sunday.
- Watering is prohibited between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. on all authorized days.

Because irrigation is prohibited on Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays, the north county reclaimed water system will be shut down on these days, as needed to allow the system to build supply. The system will also be shut down from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on all days of operation for supply recovery.

Customers should monitor the reclaimed water restrictions website for up-to-date information on shutdowns and schedule changes at pinellas.gov/watering-schedule-and-rules.



### SUGAR SAND FESTIVAL 2023

1000 tons of Clearwater sand were brought to life during the Sugar Sand Festival's ninth annual event.

#### **CELEBRATE NATIONAL BIKE WEEK** WITH SAFETY

#### From the Desk of Sheriff Bob Gualtieri

Pinellas County has miles of beautiful multi-purpose paved trails for bike riders. In addition, many roads have designated bicycle lanes to make your recreational ride or commute safer. With the warm weather here, more bikes are on our roads. As a bicyclist you must take measures to have a safer ride. And as a driver you need to be aware of a bicyclist's vulnerability. May is National Bike Month, and the Pinellas County Sheriff's Office (PCSO) wants you to enjoy your ride safely.



#### As a bike rider:

Bike riders and passengers under 16 are required to wear a helmet – but it is a good idea for ALL bike riders. Of all bike fatalities in Florida, 40 percent are from traumatic brain injuries. The helmet must be worn properly to be effective: low on the forehead and strapped snugly under the chin.

When you are riding in the road you must obey all traffic control devices, just like cars. Stay in marked lanes, obey lights and stop signs, and signal any turns. Always go in the same direction as traffic.

Florida law states that if you ride your bike at night, you need a headlight that is visible from 500 feet, and a taillight and reflector on the back that are visible from 600 feet.

Be alert – don't wear headphones that prevent you from hearing traffic and other things around you. Florida statute prohibits operation of a vehicle while wearing headphones - remember, a bicycle counts as a vehicle when on the road. The exception is a headset used with a cell phone that only has sound in one ear.

Be visible and predictable. Don't dart between vehicles or make maneuvers that a motorist can't anticipate. Wear bright colors for visibility.

You can get a DUI on a bicycle. Aside from legal considerations, riding a bike while impaired puts you at greater risk for an accident. If you are too impaired to drive, you are too impaired to ride a bicycle. Call a friend, taxi, or utilize a ride share service. You may even be able to get a ride share that can transport your bike too. If not, lock it up and get it when you're sober.

It is legal to ride a bike on the sidewalk, even if there is a bike lane available. When riding on the sidewalk, Pinellas Trail, or other path for pedestrians, wheels yield to feet. Let walkers and runners have the right of way. When passing someone who is on foot, give an audible signal, such as a bell, horn, or say, "Passing on your left."

#### As a motorist:

Always be alert for bicyclists and other pedestrians. Slow down in high-pedestrian areas.

Drivers must give bicyclists at least three feet of clearance when passing or driving alongside of them.


Yield to bicyclists and other pedestrians entering crosswalks. Remember that all sides of an intersection are considered crosswalks, whether marked or not. Don't pass a stopped vehicle at a crosswalk – the stopped car might obscure a pedestrian.

If you come to a turn when there is a bicycle in the bike lane, let them make their turn first.

#### THINGS TO DO NEARBY: TOUR DAYTONA INTERNATIONAL SPEEDWAY

You don't need to live in Florida, or even be interested in racing, to know about the Daytona International Speedway. But whether you follow NASCAR or not, a visit to the Speedway when there is no race is a fun and informative day trip.

The Speedway is only 160 miles from the Pinellas beaches - a little over three hours. When we went, we were dragging a camper, so it was closer to four hours. If you are camping, there are many nearby camping spots including the Speedway mid-field.

Daytona is the birthplace of NASCAR. The first races were held nearby on the public beach and were straight line speed races. In the mid-1930s, it evolved into a circular track and a different type of car - street cars. They raced down the beach, turned and circled back on A1A, then back on the beach for another lap.

Bill France, Sr. was involved in the early days of beach racing and raced in the first one in 1936. After that, he helped run the races. In 1947, he hosted a meeting of car owners, drivers, and mechanics at the Streamline Hotel on Daytona Beach, which led to the formation of NASCAR on February 21, 1948.

France knew NASCAR needed a permanent track that could hold large crowds. He leased 450 acres from the City of Daytona and in 1953 built a two and a half mile "super speedway," which he named the "Daytona International Speedway."

France designed the track to have "banked turns" so cars could go faster. The bank in front of the stands (and finish line) is 18 degrees. The three other banks on the course are 31 degrees. This allows cars to go up to 200 miles per hour.

The first Daytona 500 was held in 1959 and the winner was Lee Petty, Richard Petty's father (Richard has won the most Daytona 500 races – four). It took a few days to determine Lee Petty was the winner though. Race officials failed to hire enough photographers and the race was a photo finish. When

they realized they could not determine the winner, they asked fans if anyone had a photograph of the finish, and someone did.

You may have seen the Daytona International Speedway sign before. It is across the front of the Speedway and is said to be the second most photographed sign in the United States. The famous "Hollywood" sign near Los Angeles, claims the top spot.

If you are interested in seeing the Speedway but not a race, we advise you not go on race day. Race days have no tours, and are a whole other kind of event. Even a week or two before a race changes the access your tour may have because they are busy setting up.

The tour is two parts. The first is a narrated tram that includes a ride around the two and a half mile track. While a race car can do a lap in less than one-minute, the tram takes about twenty minutes.



One of the first things you will notice is the banking. some points it is 31 degrees. You can barely walk or stand up straight on that part of the track. The tram stops at the Finish Line with a mere 18-degree bank where you can get

out, sign the checkered line, walk around the track, and take pictures.

The special night lighting allows them to race at night. Each lights cost \$250 per hour to illuminate.

Your final tram stop is in the stands above the finish line where you can see the infield, concessions, and pit row. A 2016, \$400 million upgrade included replacing the seating with 101,000 comfortable "theater-like chairs." Fun fact – the seats are different random


colors. When seen on television it makes the stands look full, even when they aren't.

The tram ride is followed by a self guided "Hall of Fame of Racing" museum tour. It is a 20,000 square



foot display of race car winners, photos, boats, motorcycles, equipment, and historical facts. The the last car to win, is always on display.

Today, there are larger venues than Daytona, the Texas Motor Speedway seats 181,600, but the Daytona 500, held in February, is still the "Super Bowl of Racing" and the first race of the season. The race's television audience rivals that of the NFL's Super Bowl.

Daytona 500 tickets sell out every year and range from \$200 to over \$1800 depending on where you sit and other amenities. Unlike other events, the higher the seat, the more expensive it is. The third level, upper right corner is the most expensive seat in the house.

The 60-minute continuous tours begin at 9:30 am daily until 3pm. The tram ride lasts about an hour, you can spend as long as you wish in the museum. Tickets are \$25 for Adults, \$20 for kids aged 5 to 12, and free under 4. Register online to pick your time or at the door for the next available shuttle.

#### THE OFFSHORE REPORT

by Captain T.J. Shea



Seeing RED- that is what we hope to be doing for the next few months, along with a nice sprinkle of pink and maybe even some hues of black or silver.

May and June traditionally give loads of beautiful days on the Gulf of Mexico to run far and enjoy great topwater action. Red grouper will be legal to harvest both months and should be fired up by the perfect water

temperature. For me, the best and often overlooked bonus when fishing for red grouper is the sought-after bycatch. Lane, vermillion and mangrove snapper, triggerfish, porgy and margate all like the same limestone bottom. So, no matter what you're pulling in, good live bottom will make for an exciting day of fishing that should lead to a tasty fresh-catch dinner.

Red snapper season opens June 1st for the charter-for-hire sector while recreational anglers have to wait until June 17th. Fishing for red snapper is often very different than targeting the darker shade of red. This species of snapper takes over a spot like a swarm of bees. They swim freely in the water column, making it a challenge to get baits past them and to the bottom. Rather than weed through a thousand red snapper to catch the grouper resting below, we're happy to catch our legal snapper limit before heading

back into shallower waters.

Flatlines from the stern or side are a must. This time of year, you can count on them to sing a few times per trip as blackfin tuna and kingfish migrate through the area. Though you will have to run a little farther than in the winter or fall, this time of year is always great for bending rods and providing you with everything you need for the freshest sashimi around.



Our scuba divers will find warm and inviting water waiting for them. We will see bottom temperatures rise into the 80s and can expect to find "Clear-water" until just after the summer rains start sometime in June. For our spearfishing divers looking to put hogfish, red grouper and snapper on the dinner table, the most difficult part will be working around the massive amberjack and gag grouper that won't be legal to bring home until August and September. So, no matter how you choose to spend your time underwater, you don't want to miss out on these stellar conditions- get out there, dive as often as you can and enjoy all the Gulf of Mexico has to offer.



### COMING SOON: CONSTRUCTION OF THE NEW CHILDREN'S GARDEN AT THE FLORIDA BOTANICAL GARDENS

The new Majeed Discovery Garden (MDG) will be a free and accessible children's garden, located inside the Florida Botanical Gardens— a public, Pinellas County Park. The 2+ acres site is located along McKay Creek with five hundred linear feet of frontage. It is also adjacent to 1+ acre of wetland and native plant buffer on the east and southern boundaries of the Garden and will include a pond area for additional exploration of aquatic ecosystems.

Excavation of the pond has been completed and awaits spring and summer rains to fill. The pond includes a wood deck for the observation overlook. Major efforts by volunteers of the Florida Botanical Gardens and the FBGF have been completed to remove invasive plants within the tree protection zones, which required many hours of pruning and pulling to clean the site of theinvaders.



Rain keep and outdoor classroom

While a major portion of the site work has involved improvements of underground utilities, several features have begun to take shape above ground, including framing of the future Outdoor Classroom, which awaits exterior finishes. The Outdoor Classroom will be a 600 sq. ft screened-in building, that will serve as a main feature of the MDG - a hub for workshops, classes, field trips, and private events to be held in the garden. Adjacent to the classroom building is the 'Roots n Shoots,' another educational area that will include a potting shed, raised beds for planting, a Florida-Friendly Landscaping ™ garden, and the RainKeep, a functional rainwater harvesting sculpture by artist Allison Newsome, which can hold up to 550 gallons of rainwater. As the final step, a large log sourced from Fort De Soto Park, from a fallen Green Buttonwood Tree, was placed in the future wetland to enhance the habitat. This uniquely shaped log will provide a site for turtles and small alligators to bask in the sun, while the portions of the log that rise above the emergent wetland will certainly be a favorite perching location for birds.

Site grading is underway throughout the MDG along with preparation for the new ADA-compliant concrete walkways. The grading includes a mound that will house a play feature; either the beetle climber or temporarily a site with giant foam building blocks from Imagination Playground. These Big Blue Blocks sets are said to inspire creativity and engagement and allow for the construction of tunnels, channels, or children's own inventions. 
#### **CLEARWATER YACHT CLUB**


